The Editorial Convention.

Which was held at this place last Tuesday 14th, proved to be a more interesting gathering than was anticipated by the fraternity. There were 23 delegates in attendance, representing 23 papers. The address, by Dr. Ellis, of Goshen, was the finest we ever listened to. It was replete with good, wholesome, practical truths, which the craft would do well to take heed unto. The volunteer speeches were excellent, and the resolutions ditto. The free dinner at the Edwards House was creditable to the energy and liberality of the host, and was undoubtedly the best table ever set in town. Those who attended the dance speak of it in the most flattering terms.

This, as the first convention of the kind in Northern Indiana, has been the means of forming an extensive acquaintance between the members of the editorial corps, which will certainly be the means of creating and preserving fraternal feeling.

The next convention will be held on the first Wednesday in May, 1860, at Fort Wayne. Next week we shall publish the address, and the proceedings of the convention.

Center Township Convention.

Pursuant to public notice the Democracy of Center Township met in Convention at the Court House on Saturday June 11th, 1859, and was organized by calling J. B. N. Klinger to the chair and appointing D. McDonald Secretary. On motion of Horace Corbin a committee of three was appointed to select delegates to the County Convention. The President made said Committee to consist of J. G. Osborne, M. H. Rice, and James Hazelton. After a few remarks by Wm. Patterson Esq. the said Committee reported the following named gentlemen as delegates: Daniel Jacoby, Isaac Orr, Joel Parker, Basil Roberts, Andrew Hume, H. Corbin, S. A. Francis, Seth Bailey, John H. Goddard, John Ritter, James Hazelton, J. B. N. Klinger, David How, J. F. Vanvalkenburg, Platt McDonald, Samuel McDonald, Jacob Barnes, N. B. Klinger, P. S. Allen, C. H. Reeve, Jos. Evans, Seth Edwards, A. Gambrell, Dr. Brelsford.—24.

The report was adopted; on motion of J. F. Vanvalkenburg it was voted to instruct the delegates; the vote was afterwards reconsidered and on motion of C. H. Reeve, the delegates were instructed to give each candidate his relative strength in the County Convention. Dr. Brelsford here introduced the following Resolutions: which was adopted:

Resolved, That before balloting, the candidates present be required to pledge themselves to abide the decision of the Democratic County Convention to be held at Plymouth on the 18th day of June, 1859 and cordially support the nominee of said Convention.

N. R. Packard, Jno. K. Brooke, and Wm. M. Patterson being present announced themselves as candidates for the office of Clerk subject to the decision of the County Convention, and the above Resolution. The convention then proceeded to ballot, which resulted as follows: N. R. Packard received 110 votes; J. K. Brooke 23, Wm. M. Patterson 7, C. Cushman 1. This will give Packard 183 delegate votes, Brooke 4, Patterson 1. On motion of E. Jacoby the delegates were instructed to cast their votes to Wm. Hughs, for Commissioner from the 1st District, on motion of David Vinage, the delegates were instructed to cast their votes for S. A. Francis for Commissioner from the 2nd Dis. On motion it was ordered that the proceedings of this meeting be published in the M. C. Democrat, and on motion the convention adjourned.
