

Dr. Robert Abel honored by state 4-H foundation

WEST LAFAYETTE — The Indiana 4-H Foundation celebrated the 100th anniversary of 4-H in America at the organization's annual meeting of contributors held recently in West Lafayette.

Centennial sponsors were recognized for their special contributions during this celebratory year. Dow AgroSciences, Fifth Third Bank, United Feeds and the Central Indiana Ford Dealers were thanked for their major

gifts.

Former board members honored for their vision of an Indiana 4-H Foundation that would provide support to preserve the tradition of a strong and viable 4-H program for Indiana's youth, included in the 10 was Dr. Robert Abel, Wakarusa.

Special recognition went to Ruby A. Thompson, Lafayette, the oldest 4-H member present. She began her 4-H career in the

1920s.

During the celebration, remarks were presented by Janet Gordon, state 4-H leader; Ted McKinney, Dow AgroSciences and Stephen Ingram, executive vice-president of the Indiana 4-H Foundation.

Ingram commented, "There are four keys to success for 4-H. We must work together to promote the value of the 4-H experience for youth; we must expand our recognition

of 4-H achievement through scholarships and other means; we must recruit and retain enthusiastic 4-H members and volunteers and we must secure the resources needed to achieve these goals."

At a board of directors meeting held during the meeting, Danita Rodibaugh, Rensselaer, was selected as president and Bill Dull, Indianapolis, vice-president.

Established in 1961, the Indiana 4-H Foundation is a not-for-profit organization, committed to actively obtaining contributions to support Indiana 4-H programs. In 2001, it contributed about \$200,000 to the Indiana 4-H program through grants, scholarships and program funds.

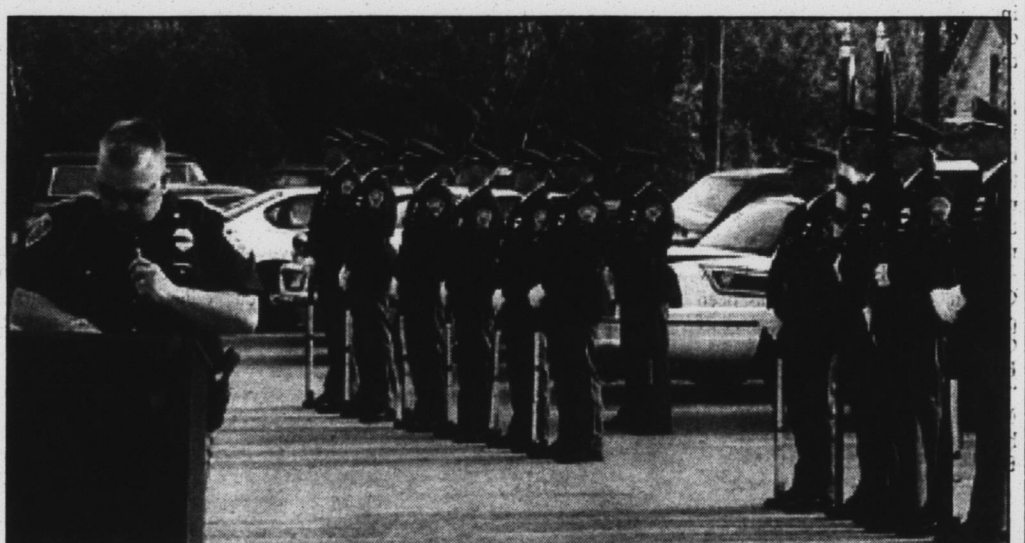
