We noticed a few days since the dispute between Governor Jackson of Florida, and the late Spanish Gov. Callava. The Nat. Intelligencer says, "in an account of that transaction, published in the Louisiana Advertiser, we find the following additional particulars, which are wholly unnoticed in the statement copied from the Floridian." It appears from his statement that Governor Jackson at Pensacola, possesses the same character that General Jackson did at New-Orleans. There the late Judge Hall issued a *Habeas Corpus* to take a man out of jail; but instead of having the usual effect of such papers, it threw his honor into jail. And had not the rheumatism very fortunately came to the relief of Judge Fromentin, his *habeas corpus* would probably have chained him along side of Callava, unless there were separate cells in the prison.

"On going to the court room, I learnt, that Judge Fromentin had pleaded inability to attend, agreeably to the Governor's summons on account of a rheumatism, which confines him for the moment to his couch. A further time has, of course, been indulged to him. Callava and his dependents having been discharged from custody, and the business is thus closed."
