One or two plays will be given by this society for the benefit of the Community.

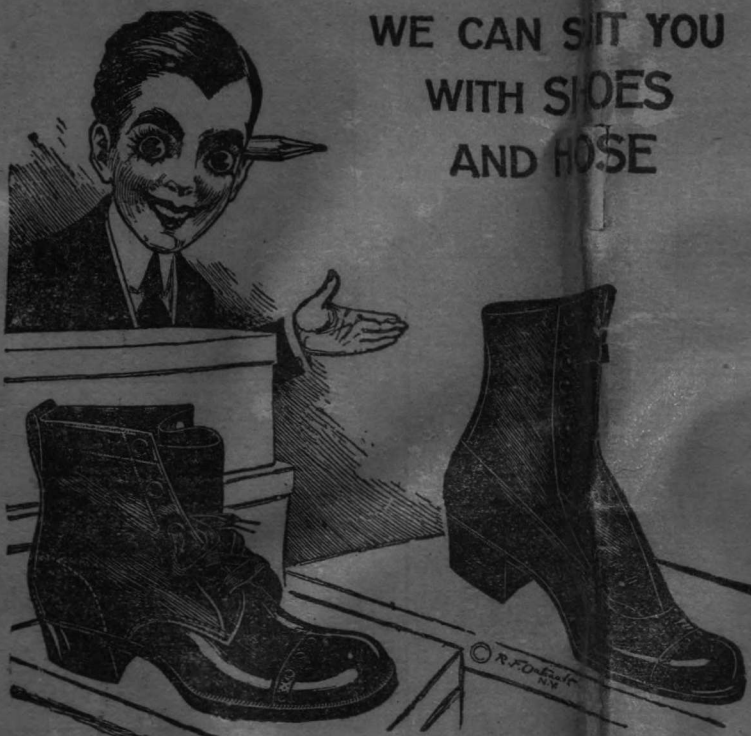
Boy's Club
