

New York, March 4.
The Empire City, from Aspinwall, the 221 ult., arrived at her wharf at 5 o'clock this afternoon, bringing the California mails, passengers, and specie of February 1st.

The Aspinwall Courier, of the 221 ult., says Secretary Marcy has instructed the mail steamship company not to pay the tax of ten per cent imposed on the steamships by the New Grenadian government; informing them that the United States government will not permit such tax to be levied.

An unsuccessful attempt was made to rob Gen. Wood's party while crossing the Isthmus.

Advices from Valparaiso are to the effect, and Callao to the 23d of Jan. A large fire occurred at Guayaquil on the 27th of Dec., destroying \$10,000 worth of property.

Peru is still quiet. Bolivia threatens, every instant, invasion. The Bolivians are about to march upon Lima with, it is said, a force of 8,000 men, but are waiting the result of the revolution in their own behalf in some of the Peruvian provinces.

The Baltic sailed to-day for Liverpool. She carried out 125 passengers, among whom was Miss Metcalf, the Italian Opera director. She also had a full freight but no specie.

The Northern Light sailed this P. M. for San Juan, with a large number of California passengers.

The friends of the Nebraska bill assembled to-day on Boston Common and fired a number of guns in honor of the passage of the bill.

About 2 o'clock this A. M., two convicts, named Donnelly and Miller, in the City Prison, made a desperate attempt to escape, but were fortunately prevented. Donnelly was shot in the arm by one of the keepers.

A conspiracy of a most atrocious character has come to light in Missillon, Ohio. A number of young men were banded together for the purpose of robbery and arson, and one of the rules of the organization empowered any member to take life when it stood in the way of the success of their enterprise, or to shield them from danger. Some of the conspirators have been arrested, and the officers are after the others.—Cin. Gaz.
