Sentenced and gone.—During last week's term of the Circuit Court, there were three others, (besides the one we mentioned in our last issue,) sentenced to the penitentiary. James Phillips, who has heretofore been charged with several offences, was sentenced for four years upon a charge of grand larceny.

An Irishman charged with committing a rape upon a little girl about 12 years of age, was sentenced for two years.

Also the young man in custody, charged with forgery, was sentenced for two years, and on Monday morning week, Sheriff Thompson started for the South with four new representatives from Marshall county.
