EDITORIAL NOTES.

The naming of the Commission takes a burden from the Executive mind.

The United States soldier is better provided for than the soldier of any other country on earth.

The President has appointed 118 Postmasters since the adjournment of Congress on the 4th inst.

The people of Michigan will vote on the proposed Prohibitory Constitutional amendment, the 4th prox.

There are many reasons for saying that the United States has a right to the name of being the greatest nation on earth.

It is settled that Mr. Fairchild is to be Secretary of the Treasury, though the announcement will not be made until the 1st of April.

This meeting of the Indiana Democratic Editorial Association, at Milwaukee in July, promises to be the largest and most enthusiastic ever held in the State.

Some difficulty is experienced in telling whether the strong partisan or the mugwump experiences the more chagrin. They are looking at one another with green eyes.

The St. Louis Globe-Democrat, Republican, says that Cleveland will be re-nominated by the Democrats for the Presidency, and that the Republicans cannot defeat him with Mr. Blaine as their standard-bearer.

Those Prohibition Letters.

THE INTER-STATE COMMISSIONERS

As appointed by the President.

The Inter-State Commissioners were appointed on March 22. The Commissioners are: Thomas Cooley, Republican, of Michigan, for six years; William R. Morrison, Democrat, of Illinois, for five years.

Augustus Schoonmaker, Democrat, of Kingston, N. Y., for four years.

Adice O. Walker, Republican, of Rutland, Vt., for three years.

Walter L. Bragg, Democrat, of Alabama, for two years.

Walker and Schoonmaker are the men lately agreed upon, and are but little known. Walker is a lawyer, forty-four years old, who has made the railroad question a study, and is now a State Senator. He studied law and will, therefore, not be obeyed by those whose appetites are stronger than their wills. The law which says "Thou shalt not kill" emanates from a moral element inherent in every human heart, and disobedience to it is brought on by an over-ruled passion.

A law which forbids drinking or eating does not originate in a universal consciousness forbidding the satisfying of the appetite, while its violation depends upon a ruling appetite.

Judge Cooley is probably the ablest man on the Commission. He was born in Attica, N. Y., in 1824, and removed to Michigan in 1833. He has been elected a Justice of the Supreme Court of Michigan three times, and is now the Reeve of the Wabash Railroad. He is a mugwump, and voted for Cleveland.

Briggs is forty-nine years old. He was educated at Harvard and the Cambridge Law School.

Morrison is sixty-two, and his career is familiar. He was set down on all hands as the man who would be President of the Commission, but that part of the programme has been overthrown.
