## POULTRY


### KEEP RATS AWAY FROM HENS

Rodents Destroy Feed, Eggs and Fowls and Are Inveterate Enemies to All Poultry.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Every poultryman should be on guard continually against rats. They destroy feed, eggs and fowls, and are inveterate enemies to all kinds of poultry, from chicks, squabs, ducklings and young turkeys just out of the shell to tough old birds awaiting the hatchet at the close of a long and noisy career. Although most of their depredations are confined to eggs and young birds, when driven by hunger rats kill full-grown fowls at roost, biting them through the head or neck.

Complaints about rats have come to the United States biological survey, department of agriculture, from many

quarrels. For example, a farmer in Virginia reported 26 turkeys killed by these pests in a night. Another, in Kansas, lost between 200 and 300 chickens and many eggs by rats during the course of one summer. His neighbors had similar experiences. From New Jersey has come a report of rats killing young ducks. An Ohioan has complained that the animals burrow beneath his coops and take chicks from under the hen. In certain neighborhoods of Massachusetts half a season's hatch of chickens and ducklings have been killed by rats.

Rats multiply rapidly when left undisturbed, where there is plenty to eat. One pair may increase to more than 2,000 in a single year. Whoever allows his property to become overrun by them invites vexation and loss.

### MIXTURE FOR LITTLE CHICKS

Give Equal Parts of Hard-Boiled Eggs and Rolled Oats or Stale Bread Soaked in Milk.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

For the first three days chicks may be fed a mixture of equal parts of hard-boiled eggs and rolled oats or stale bread, or stale bread soaked in milk. When bread and milk are used care should be taken to squeeze all the milk out of the bread. From the third or fourth day commercial chick feed may be fed until the chicks are old enough to eat wheat screenings or cracked corn.

### PLAN FOR MARKETING EGGS

Brown and White Shells Should Be Placed in Separate Packages—Keep All Culls.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Market white-shelled and brown-shelled eggs in separate packages. Eggs irregular in shape, those which are unusually long or thin-shelled, or which have shells otherwise defective, should be kept by the producer for home use, so that breakage in transit may be reduced as much as possible.

### POULTRY NOTES

All males except those needed for breeding purposes, should be got rid of as soon as possible.

One of the best inside linings for poultry houses is tar paper, tacked on smoothly. Mites do not bother it.

It is said that farmers lose millions of dollars annually on account of poor methods of producing and handling eggs.

Be a crank about cleanliness, mites, lice and disease in your poultry yard and see if it doesn't pay a big dividend.

Diseases of poultry are frequently transmitted through the drinking water; the drinking fountain should be cleaned daily.

Chicks on good range get practically all they need in the way of mineral salts through the fresh vegetables, but ranges are often overrated.

Help save eggs by keeping the nests clean and free from lice. Gather eggs twice daily, keep them in a cool, dry room or cellar, and market twice a week.

Little chickens are often bothered with the large gray-head lice. These may be destroyed by greasing the head and throat with lard or sweet oil and using a louse powder elsewhere.

### HELPFUL HINTS.

To the average cook with little imagination and less ingenuity a bowl of chicken broth, a half-dozen cold boiled potatoes, a cupful of tomato, a wedge of cheese will appear like "the primrose upon the river's brink, simple primrose it was to him, and it was nothing more." It is neither possible nor is it wise to carry a large number of recipes or proportions of ingredients in one's mind, but the efficient woman will have a card index, a notebook or a chart on which she notes the possibilities of various small amounts of materials which in other homes are thrown out, left to spoil or are used carelessly in foods so that their charm of flavor is lost.

The pleasant thing about this system is that it is always growing, new dishes will occur to one and the list will grow. Then when going to the ice chest and finding a bowl of chicken broth, visions of all the savory dishes which may be seasoned with that savory food will be realized in some good dish, as it takes but a moment to turn to the recipe.

Another helpful convenience of the card catalogue idea is to have the system carried out in other ways in the household. Under linens put cards labeled "bed linen," on the card numbers of sheets, pillowslips, and where they are. This is not only a convenience when absent to pass on, but in case of fire loss to give a correct record.

Attached to the medicine closet should be a card always where it can be found at once, especially where there are many little people, giving first aids in case of accident and antidotes for common poisons. The older children should be taught how to use this knowledge, as often lives are lost because nobody "new what to do quickly. It is a frequently noted fact that the people who know what to do or where to go to find out, rarely take time to go into hysterics in an emergency; they are too busy doing things. Start a card catalogue house and see what a pleasure it is to be methodical. It is not necessary to have an expensive filing cabinet.

SUMMER SALAD WITH DRESSINGS

We all enjoy something different in salads and the ingenious cook is ever combining new materials to make appetizing dishes.

**Virginia Salad.**—Cut cold cooked potato in cubes, using one and a half cupfuls, add one cooked cauliflower cut in flowerets and three tomatoes cut in quarters. Marinate each of these vegetables separately in French dressing, using four tablespoonsfuls of olive oil and two of tarragon vinegar, three-fourths of a teaspoonful of pepper sauce and half a teaspoonful of salt. Cut one and one-half cupfuls of chicken in cubes, three hard-cooked eggs cut in small pieces and mix with the marinated potato, with mayonnaise seasoned with catsup. Place the chicken mixture in the center of the dish, cover with tomato mayonnaise and garnish with cauliflower and lettuce with one tomato arranged alternately. Decorate with one hard-cooked egg, cut in eighths, and nasturtium seeds.

**Tomato Jelly Salad.**—Take two cupfuls of tomato juice, either fresh or canned; to it add one-fourth cupful of mild vinegar, two tablespoonsfuls of gelatin, a tablespoonful of sugar, bit of bayleaf, leaves from two stalks of celery, two slices of onion and one and one-half tablespoonsfuls of lemon juice. Stir and cook over heat until the gelatin is dissolved, then strain. Set in crushed ice and when it begins to stiffen, add fresh raw dandelion leaves cut in bits. Mold the jelly; when firm turn out on a platter and garnish with cooked egg, green pepper and scallops which have been cut in pieces and fringed at each end, then put into ice water to curl. Cabbage may be used instead of dandelion leaves.

**Joe's Dressing.**—Take one teaspoonful each of salt and mustard, two teaspoonsfuls of sugar, a dash of cayenne, a whole egg, one and one-half tablespoonsfuls of flour, two tablespoonsfuls of corn oil, half a cupful of evaporated milk, one-fourth cupful each of vinegar and water. Mix the dry ingredients and then cook all together in a double boiler.

**Hot Salmon With Egg Sauce.**—Set the can of salmon in a saucepan of boiling water and cook for half an hour. Cut the can close; drain off the liquid and turn out the fish in a solid piece on a hot dish. Surround with well seasoned buttered peas, and serve with an egg sauce. This is a rich white sauce, using some of the liquid from the can and milk, then add one hard-cooked egg mashed, and put through a sieve. Garnish with parsley.
