We are desired to state that HENRY AN, and JOHN FINLEY, esq. will serve as representatives in the State Legislature.

On the 11th the Senate adjourned on the 26th, that Congress has terminated its labors; whether it has advanced the interest of the nation will be questioned by many.

The Tariff Bill, with several valuable amendments, was ordered to a third reading on the 12th, by a vote, of 26 to 21.—On the 13th, a motion was made for its indefinite postponement, but was rejected by a vote of 20 to 27. The Bill was then passed by the following vote:

In the 11th, in the Senate, the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Bill was read a second time, and referred to the committee on Roads and Canals.

On the 13th, in the House of Representatives, after many unsuccessful motions to amend, the Bill for the relief of the surviving officers and soldiers of the Revolution was ordered to a third reading, by a vote of 124 to 64. Debate was again commenced upon its passage, but was arrested by a call for the previous question, when the Bill was passed by the following vote: yeas 115, nays 50.—Messrs. Smith and Wake voting in the affirmative. This Bill, which grants the officers full pay for the only needs the signature of the President to become a law.

On the 14th, the committees of conference between the two houses on the subject of their disagreement respecting the amendment made by the Senate, limiting the appropriation for surveys to those already commenced, made the following report, which was agreed to by both Houses:

"The managers agreed to recommend to their respective Houses the following compromise, to wit:

That the House of Representatives do recede from its vote on the 5th amendment of the Senate, and that the Senate do consent to modify the third amendment, by striking out all after the words "defraying the expenses," in the first line, and inserting "incident to carrying on the examinations & surveys for internal improvements," under the act of the 30th April, 1823. Forty thousand dollars; provided, That the appropriation shall not be construed into a legislative sanction of any examination or survey which shall not be deemed of national importance, or within the provisions of the aforesaid act of the 30th April, 1823."

On the same day, the House ordered to a third reading, by a vote of 106 to 73, the Bill to abolish the office of Major General in the army in the peace establishment.

On the 13th, the House of Representatives passed the bill to abolish the office of Major General. The Committee raised some weeks previously on the subject of Retrenchment, made two reports, one by the majority, or opposition members of the committee, the other by the minority. Six thousand copies of both reports were ordered to be printed.

The amendments made in the Senate to the Tariff Bill were all concurred in by the House, and the signature of the President was only necessary to make it a law. The National Journal remarks on this Bill.

"In the shape in which the bill has been returned from the Senate, many of the objections which originally existed against its passage have been removed; and the measure has assumed a character which will make it much more agreeable to those interests which mostly needed the protecting arm of the government."

On the 16th, the committee appointed by the House on the subject of the assault upon the President's son, while carrying a message to the Senate, reported through their chairman; and a report was also made by the minority of the committee; both of which were ordered to be printed.

Indiana College.—The Trustees of this institution organized themselves into a Board on the fifth inst. and elected Dr. ANDREW WILLIE, as President of the College. Dr. Willie is at this time President of Washington College, Pennsylvania; and his qualifications are highly spoken of.—The first session of the College will commence on the first Monday of June next. The price of tuition is \$5 per session, or \$10 per year.

Jacksonism.—A teacher of youth, in this county, declared lately his belief, that, if a sufficient quantity of whiskey were prepared to give all an opportunity to become intoxicated on the day of the Presidential election, Gen. Jackson would surely be elected—and that he would freely give a barrel for the purpose!!!

Lest an erroneous impression may go abroad as to the real extent to which the bill for the relief of the survivors of the revolutionary army goes, it may be proper to state that it does not embrace all the veterans of that interesting period. Its operation is confined to those officers who were entitled to the half pay under the resolutions of Congress of 1780, and to those private soldiers who were entitled to a bounty of eighty dollars. We know many members, who voted against the present bill, who would have supported any bill which embraced the whole of the officers; and it is due to them, as well as necessary for the correct information of the public, that it should be understood to what extent the bill actually goes.—*National Journal.*

The Telegraph of the 13th instant asserts, from "good authority," that the Secretary of the Navy "but a few days since gave a contract for 7000 dollars worth of cordage to a partisan in Georgetown, who is employed in running up and down the wharves in Georgetown, for the purpose of distributing scurrilous publications against Gen. Jackson." This, like most of the assertions in that veracious Press, is utterly false. The Secretary of the Navy never gave a contract in his life for cordage, or any other material, "to a partisan" or any other person. It forms no part of his duty to make contracts.—This is done by the Commissioners of the Navy, who are empowered by the law to procure all naval stores and materials, and who regularly advertise when they want supplies, that the public at large may bid for the contract. But in the present case we state from "good authority," that no contract for cordage has been made with any person in Georgetown, either by the Secretary, the Commissioners, or any body acting under their orders! What can the people think of a Press that can thus deliberately and insolently lead them astray, when the means of correct information were within such convenient reach?
