

TWENTY GOOD REASONS.

Why Working Men Should vote with the People's Party.

F. G. R. Gordon, secretary of the People's party State committee of New Hampshire, has issued a circular giving the following twenty reasons why working men should vote with the People's party:

It is the only party that stands for the true interests of the wealth producers.

After twenty five years of democratic and republican rule, we have a debt of \$32,000,000,000, with 9,000,000 mortgaged homes and 4,000,000 out of employment, with 1,014,701 tenant farmers and 2,000,000 tramps. During these twenty-five years the two old parties have given the rich railroad corporations land enough to give us all a farm.

In 1860 the farmers and wage workers owned 75 per cent of the wealth of the country. Today they own less than 25 per cent.

In the last ten years our farmers and toilers increased our national wealth \$22,000,000,000, and every dollar of it has gone into the hands of plutocracy.

Both the old parties are controlled by Wall Street, in the interest of banks, corporations and trusts.

Neither of the old parties offer a remedy. History does not record a single case of an old party reforming itself.

THE PEOPLE'S PARTY DEMAND: Government ownership of railroads, telegraph and telephones, express lines, mines, and all other natural monopolies.

A currency, safe, sound, and flexible, issued by the general government only;

Postal savings banks for the safe deposit of the savings of the people;

Free and unlimited coinage of gold and silver at the ratio of 16 to 1;

A graduated income tax;

That the school age be raised and child labor prohibited;

That hours of labor for men and women be reduced by legislation;

The initiative and referendum system for city and state;

U. S. Senators and President be elected by a direct vote;

Municipal ownership of natural monopolies such as water works, gas and electric lighting, surface and elevated railroads;

Public lands reserved for actual settlers;

Money enough to do business on a cash basis;

Abolition of interest bearing bonds;

A government of, by and for the People, based upon the Principles laid down in the Declaration of Independence.





A good soaking rain visited Rensselaer last Sunday and did a great deal of good.




