Geo. Platt is out again after six weeks sickness with typhoid fever.

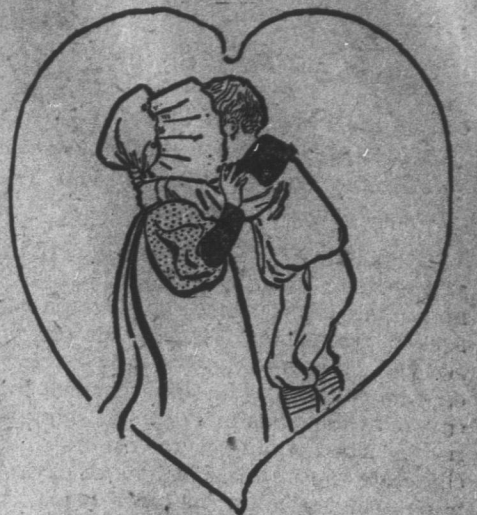
John Kohler has all the brick for the court house burned and is delivering them as fast as they can be put in the wall.
