Poverty, Sickness and Crime. Some very distressing crimes have occurred of late, in which the horror caused by the crime does not altogether smother the sentiment of pity for the misery and unhappiness that preceded it. Such was that of the poor man who recently killed his three little girls because he could not support them, and more. If they grew up in poverty they would lead a life of shame. Well-to-do people may say what a wild conception, what a miserable motive was this, but it is possible to conceive of a state of mental despair which would make a father regard such a crime as preferable to the possibility of such a fate for his daughters. The annals of the poor furnish too many instances of most as tragic and touching, in purpose, which the emotion of sympathy with suffering gives side by side with that of condemnation for crime. One such, & notable, occurred in Chicago a few days ago. A poor tailor, who earned six cents an hour, pressing coats for a wholesale tailoring firm, was barely able to keep body and soul together. He asked his employer for an increase on each coat, and, instead of an increase, got his discharge. This was more than he could stand, and he determined on suicide. Writing to his wife of his misfortune and his intention, he said: "I looked all over for another place, but could not find one. I don't know what I shall do now. I have made up my mind not to return to you again. Looked over the constitution of the Merchant, and find that if a brother commits a wife and children receive their regular benefit—\$500; and from the Death you will have no difficulty in getting the money to bury me. You will be better off than if I live. Therefore it is my intention to end this miserable life, and I have picked out the Douglas monument as the place to die. There you will find my corpse. I beg you to forgive me. I can't do otherwise." His body was found at the designated place, with a bullet through the brain. It is easy to moralize on the criminality of suicide, and the cowardice of deserting a wife, but who shall undertake toathom the despair of a man who finds himself deprived of hope as well as of bread?
