shocking Accident—Man Killed.

Just as we were going to press this (Thursday) morning, a heart-sickening accident occurred on Hewitt & Woodward's new brick building, resulting in the instant death of one of the workmen, named Isaac Leak. A stick of timber was being elevated to the third story by means of pulleys, when just as it had reached its destination, it suddenly turned and slipped through the fastenings, and fell a distance of about thirty feet, one end of it striking the deceased on the back part of the head, killing him instantly. An inquest will probably be held to-day.

The deceased had resided in Illinois for the past six years, and had started to see his mother, who lives in Pennsylvania. He arrived in town last week, and being short of funds, concluded to work and earn enough to carry him home.

The County Fair.

The attendance at the County Fair was better than was anticipated, owing to the wet weather.

The articles exhibited would compare favorably with those of former years. The vegetable and fruit were very fine. The mechanical department was almost wholly unrepresented. There were a few specimens of the Fine Arts exhibited. Mrs. E. S. Cushman, of Tyler City, had on exhibition a very creditable painting—"A New England Scene." We noticed some wax fruit, flowers, &c., but do not know the name of exhibitor.

The Ladies' Riding Match attracted general attention. The prize, a fine side-saddle, was awarded to Mrs. L. A. Joseph. The other ladies rode very well. It was a subject of general remark among spectators, that Miss Rogers managed her horse with the greatest ease and dexterity.

The trotting match did not amount to much, as there were no fast horses present. "Inside of four minutes" was the fastest time made. One old pacing horse, from Union, made his mile in 2:27. The most exciting performance was after the close of the Fair. A number of gentlemen made up a purse to be run for. Some eight or ten horses were entered. The purse was taken by a horse from Bourbon. Time, 2:12.

Altogether everything passed off pleasantly, and to the satisfaction of all concerned. The next annual meeting of the Society will be held the first Saturday in January, 1862.
