IN ADDITION TO THE PAY AS ABOVE STATED, ONE RATION PER DAY AND AN ABUNDANT SUPPLY OF GOOD CLOTHING IS ALLOWED TO EVERY SOLDIER. QUARTERMASTER AND MEDICAL ATTENDANCE ARE ALWAYS PROVIDED BY THE GOVERNMENT WITHOUT DEDUCTION FROM THE SOLDIER'S PAY. IF A SOLDIER SHOULD BECOME DISABLED IN THE LINE OF HIS DUTIES, THE LAW PROVIDES FOR HIM A PENSION, OR HE MAY, IF HE PREFER, OBTAIN ADMISSION INTO THE MILITARY ASYLUM, WHICH WILL AFFORD HIM A COMFORTABLE HOME SO LONG AS HE MAY WISH TO RESIDE THERE.
