Virginia City, Nevada Territory.

The following is an extract of a private letter written by a gentleman, formerly a resident of Cincinnati, and published in the Engineer of that city:

"I have not told you anything about Virginia City. Well, it is a town such as they can only get up on the Pacific Slope. It was laid out three years ago. Now it contains 30,000 inhabitants. It stands 8,000 feet up on the Sierra Nevada range, on the side of an almost perpendicular mountain. It is built upon a honeycomb of mines, some of which are the richest in the world. The town is compactly built, and the style of architecture equals that of Cincinnati. On a clear day you can stand in the street and see over three ranges of mountains, to a distance of two hundred and fifty miles. The country produces nothing but silver, and that in abundance. One man here has a claim of twenty feet in a ledge known here as Comstock. He works it himself, and takes therefrom \$2,500 daily. This will, in all probability, last until doomsday. The market price of the Gould and Curry ledge is \$15,000 per foot, and there are claims still richer.
