"Both soldiers and citizens have reason to rejoice that brighter prospects lie before them. Ever since our advance into East Tennessee we have been carrying on operations under very great difficulties. The sufferings of our soldiers for two months after the siege, were unprecedented in the history of our present struggle, and the destructiveness and vandalism of our soldiers have brought down most intense suffering upon the citizens. Many families have been sent South; many loyal families have gone or are going North; and the country will soon be almost depopulated."

Startling Figures in a "free" Country.

Add to the above 34,000 seamen and we have a grand total of TWO MILLIONS, TWO HUNDRED AND SEVENTY THREE THOUSAND, SEVEN HUNDRED AND FORTY EIGHT men whose lives have been called for by this despot at Washington, to be offered up on the Abolition shrine as a sacrifice to the party in power.

Aside from this untold waste of human life, another matter claims attention. It is the enormous debt saddled on the backs of the hard working mechanics and laborers of the land. A debt looming up in three short years to FOUR THOUSAND MILLIONS OF DOLLARS, that is to be left as a legacy to the generations yet unborn! THE FRUIT CROPS.—At a meeting of the Cincinnati Horticultural Society on yesterday, it was generally conceded that while the peaches are generally killed, there will be a partial crop of apples and pears. The cherries are nearly all killed. In regard to grapes there was considerable difference of opinion. In some vineyards the buds had been found to be destroyed, but in others not more than half. Considerable hope was entertained in regard to the latent buds, which, on the whole, might tend to the production of at least half a crop.—*Cin Enquirer.*
