DEMOCRATIC COUNTY CONVENTION.

There will be a Democratic County Convention held at the Court House in Plymouth on **Saturday June 25th 1864.**

At 1 o'clock P. M. for the purpose of Nominating Candidates to fill the offices of Sheriff, Treasurer, and Commissioner—also to Elect Delegates to the State Democratic Convention and the Congressional Convention.

It is recommended that the Democrats of the several Townships hold their Township Conventions on

Saturday June 18th at 1 P. M. and elect Delegates to the County Convention the ratio of representation being one Delegate for every 25 Democratic votes cast at the last October election. And one additional vote for every fraction over 25 excepting ten in number. Which entitles each township to the following number of delegates:
