Congress having resolved at its last session that no insurgent State shall be allowed to cast an electoral vote for President, we are anxious to know what will be done in the case of Tennessee. She is an insurgent State as much as South Carolina, and by a proper construction of the resolution as we understand it, cannot cast her electoral vote for President. The nominee for Vice President is a resident of this insurgent State, and it would look rather curious under the present system of things, as conducted by abolitionists, to have an "unconditional Union" Vice President from a rebel State that is ruled out of the Union by an "unconditional Union" administration, and which by a resolution of Congress can have no electoral vote.—Port Wayne Times.

It is stated that no rebel infantry have crossed the Potomac; that the force which occupied Chambersburg was composed of three regiments of cavalry, with five pieces of artillery; and that a body of rebel cavalry is moving in the direction of Bedford, Co. Curran has called a special session of the Pennsylvania Legislature, to adopt measures for the defence of the State.—The Susquehanna River is to be fortified.

Henry J. Raymond and other republican politicians are said to be endeavoring to induce Mr. Lincoln to give Gen. McClellan a command on the defenses of Washington.
