Guns for the Loyal League.

The Leagues here most emphatically deny that they are armed or intend to be, a dozen of the most prominent men among them have made that assertion within the last two days. But we call attention to a little transaction that took place in Pershing & Co's Drug Store on Friday evening last. At a caucus there held it was decided that they had not arms enough, and five of the most rabid and reliable among them signed a note which was negotiated at the Bank by which a large sum of money was raised, and one of the number sent at once as agent to Indianapolis to procure arms. Military commanders and Provost Marshals within the Northern Department are required to see this order executed, and seize all such articles as may be clandestinely sold.
