A New York dispatch announces that a pilot boat, fifty miles west of Cape May, fell in with fragments of the steam transport Admiral Dupont. The Admiral Dupont left New York on the 7th for Fort Monroe to take troops to Texas.

We publish this week the law "for the relief of the families of Soldiers," &c., passed by the Legislature at its last session. The provisions of the law have not heretofore been generally understood, and as a large class of our fellow citizens are interested in knowing the details of the law, we give it entire, so that "all whom it may concern" can readily refer to the law itself for information.

The Times' Washington special says: "Reverdy Johnson's argument for the defense in the assassination trial is mainly devoted to the question of jurisdiction, and of the power of the military commission to try the case. Johnson makes further objection, that certain of the members of the commission, including Gen. Hunter, A. D. C., are mentally and morally disqualified for trying the prisoners."

An Indianapolis dispatch of Saturday says Adj. Gen. Terrell has been officially notified that all 1862 regimental organizations will be mustered out at once. All Indiana troops will come here for the purpose. He is notified to make ready for their reception within ten days. Schofield regiments will come via Baltimore, Parkersburg and Lawrenceburg; and from the Gulf and western departments, by river via Jeffersonville. The 88th, 97th and 100th Indiana left Washington yesterday. The 68th, 25th, 58th, 60th, 48th, and 59th were publicly received to day.

The St. Louis Democrat asserts that there were immense frauds in that state in the last constitutional election. It may be that bushwhackers, disloyalists, rebel sympathizers and guerrillas conspired to defeat the "loyal." If they did vote illegally, early and often, they were but imitating the example which radicals have given them the past four years. They did not carry their wickedness so far as the radicals. They did not surround the polls and drive away lawful voters with bayonets. If the power of the military and of the bold, bad men who have ruled the states with a rod of iron since the commencement of the war, is so far broken that their opponents can carry an election, even by fraud, it argues a much better state of society than has lately existed there.—Chicago Times.

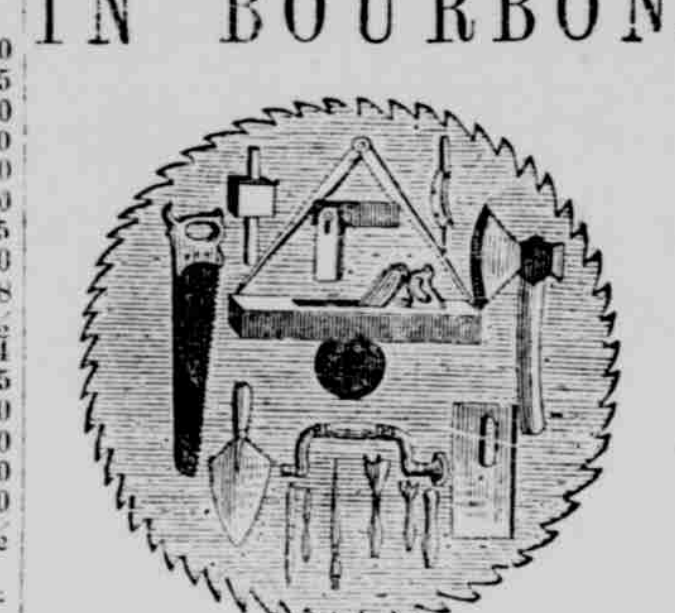
