MASONIC.—We understand that the preparatory steps are being taken to organize a Council of Royal and Select Masters at this place, as soon as the new Masonic Hall is dedicated. There is already a flourishing lodge, and a good working Chapter here, and when the Council is organized there will be abundant opportunity for brethren of the "mystic tie" to "ascend upwards" on the grade of the fraternal relations.

SHARP PRACTICE.—We are informed that certain parties at Indianapolis are engaged in the business of purchasing from the returned soldiers their discharge papers, paying about one half the amount due for arrears. Many of the boys have been away from home so long that they are willing to take less than is due them in order not to be detained longer from home and friends. The man who would speculate off of the necessities of brave men just returning from the war would be guilty of any enormity however great.

The shore end of the Atlantic telegraph cable was landed at Valencia on the 22d ult., amid the most unbounded enthusiasm. Speeches were made by the Knight of Kerry and others, and cheers given for Queen Victoria and President Johnson.

A "LOYAL" PLOT TO ASSASSINATE.—A plot was discovered a few days ago among a large number of negro workmen at Aquia Creek, Va., to assassinate all the white workmen on the railroad at that place. Will the President see that they are promptly executed? If they had been respectable workmen, charged by a few tyrannical abolitionists with a plot to assassinate some insolent good-for-nothing free nigger, we could very soon conjecture their doom under the decree of the twin barbarians, Johnson and Stanton. But they are "loyal" colored citizens, and of course will not be punished.

BILLIARDS.—J. H. Williams has opened a new Billiard Hall on the 3d floor of Humrichouser's brick. It is a complete affair and deserves patronage, as the proprietor evidently designs to make it a first class place of amusement, regardless of expense. The Hall was well filled on the opening night, and will doubtless continue to be, for certainly no pleasant place to pass a leisure hour can be found in Plymouth.

A boy some fifteen or sixteen years old was brought before J. G. Osborne, J. P., for examination on Friday last on a charge of horse stealing. He waived an examination and in default of bail was committed to jail to await the action of the Grand Jury in his case. His name is Hiram C. Lee, and it is believed that he has been used as an instrument in the hands of a gang of thieves who infest the country at this time. If so, he is perhaps more sinned against than sinning, and steps should be taken to ferret out and bring to punishment those who have drawn him away from the path of virtue.

SICKNESS.—There has been recently considerable sickness (mostly Diarrhea) among children in this locality. A number of deaths have occurred and we fear as the season advances there will be a manifest increase in the number of cases of this too frequently fatal disease. Parents should guard the little ones from a too free indulgence in the use of green corn and unripe fruits and vegetables. Regularity in sleep and wholesome diet with plenty of fresh air and exercise will do much to preserve the health of all, but especially the young.

Editors Plymouth Democrat:

Mattingly says that singularly enough only one Republican was drawn on the Grand Jury for the August Term of the Circuit Court. Perhaps that should remind him of a somewhat similar incident that happened in 1862. Mattingly was at that time Drafting Commissioner for this County, and out of the twelve names drawn from Polk Township "singularly" enough it so happened that only one was a Republican. Nine were Democrats and two were minors. In North Township "singularly" enough a similar phenomenon occurred, as did also in Green, and it so happened that it was only two or three days before the election, and "singularly" enough this same Mattingly used every effort in his power to rush the drafted men off to Camp before the election, and was only prevented by the peremptory orders of his superior officer forbidding it. Perhaps it is proper for him to charge the Commissioners of this County, all of whom are old and respected citizens, who lived here long before he disgraced the County and the Republican party by coming here to reside, with packing a Jury, but people generally will fail to see it.

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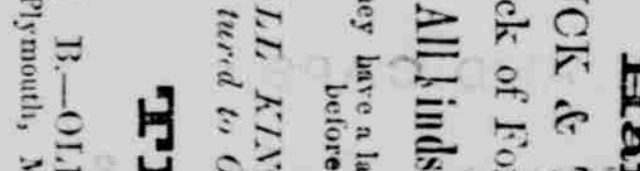
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
