John Palmer has sold out his interest in the livery business, and Mr. John Boyes we understand, takes his place. The business will hereafter be conducted by Messrs. Parker and Boyes at the old stand.

A thief entered the house of Daniel Jacoby about nine o'clock last Thursday night, but was discovered before he had time to carry any thing off. He made good his escape, however, but not until the watch dog of Mr. J. had pretty badly frightened him.

The wheat in this county generally looks badly, and the farmers think that more than half the fields sown will prove a failure. We hope, however, that after a few days more of warm weather the prospect may look better than at present. Wheat has not looked so badly within the last fifteen years as it does this spring.

**REMOVAL.**—Potter and Welch have completed their new Livery Stable on the corner of La Porte and Walnut streets, and removed their stock of horses, carriages, etc., into it. They are prepared to accommodate the public with anything in the livery line at all times.

Preparations are making for the erection, this season, of a large number of dwelling houses in our town. These are much needed and will tend to the reduction of the enormously high rents prevailing here for the last two years. At least one hundred good dwelling houses should be erected here this season.

Joel Parker, Esq., the new proprietor of the Edwards House, will take possession next month. He is already repairing the establishment and intends, we understand, to fit it up in first rate order and to furnish it new throughout.

Joe Potter wants us to say for the benefit of the citizens of Plymouth, that he has his ice house filled with the best quality of ice, and will furnish individuals and families with any amount they may desire. Joe is determined the citizens shall "keep cool" this summer.

The unsightly mass of dirt and brick at the corner opposite the Edwards House, which has been the subject of not a little complaint during the winter, has been principally removed, and pedestrians in that locality can now pass along without the danger of becoming swamped in the mud, or basking their necks by stumbling over the bricks and rubbish. The new eastern wall soon be finished and filled with water from the river ready for use in case of fire.

We were shown a mortgage at the Recorder's office in this place last Tuesday, given by the Cincinnati, Rochester & Chicago Railroad Company for the sum of six hundred thousand dollars. The money will be furnished to the company in May, when the work on the road from here to Peru will be pushed forward with renewed vigor. The early completion of this road is a matter of vast importance to the people of Northern Indiana.

The mortgage in question contained three revenue stamps, the aggregate value of which was six hundred dollars.

We were made the recipient a few days since, of an invitation to partake of the hospitality of mine host of the National Hotel, Mr. George Koch, and of course accepted. George keeps a good house, and we found everything in first rate order.
