**OUR STREETS AND ALLEYS.**—The streets and alleys of our town are in a miserably filthy and careless condition. Many of the side-walks are partly torn up, and serve as a very good trap or snare for passers-by to run into and skin their shins, thereby causing them to "eas." Some of the most prominent streets in the place are almost entirely blockaded with piles of stone, stumps, trunks of old trees—whose branches have rotted away and returned to their mother earth, without being molested by either the marshal, supervisor, or property owners near by—piles of wood, old piano boxes, heaps of worthless brick-bats, old mortar, &c., &c., ad infinitum.

From now until the frost shall have eaten them down, we will be favored with the sight of gigantic ginseng and other weeds growing along the walks all over town, because the citizens of the place have too little pride and are too indolent to spend five minutes with a hoe to cut them down.

Some walks that have been ordered put down for at least two years are not completed and probably never will be, because those who were ordered to put them down are good fellows, and the authorities "do not want to make them mad." Some widow women who have to work hard for a living have been compelled to put down their walks, while half men, in the prime of life go "soot free" from year to year. We do not think these things are right, and respectfully call the attention of the proper officials to these facts. If there is no way to induce or compel property owners to put down walks as ordered, there are many citizens of the place who are interested in knowing it. They are those pay their taxes and keep their streets free from obstructions and nuisances.

There should also be an ordinance passed requiring the occupants of business stands to put into the street once a week, all the straw and litter of every kind that comes of unpacking their goods, and a scavenger should be employed to draw it away, thereby making the streets look several hundred per cent. better, and making them more healthy and convenient. Our place is large enough and wealthy enough to "dress up" very considerably, and we hope it will. There is want of efficiency somewhere, for the present state of affairs ought not to exist. There is an order on the order book of the corporation prohibiting the citizens from using the street as a wood yard, or from keeping it obstructed in any way, and it is the duty of the marshal to see that this order is enforced, and we believe there is one also making it the duty of the same official to see that the side walks are put down in a reasonable length of time, and if the property owners do not, then it shall be advertised and all the costs of putting down the walk, &c., charged to the property. If these ordinances cannot be enforced we will advise the board of trustees to do with them as they did with the notorious hog ordinance—repeal them.

**CENTER TOWNSHIP DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION.**—Pursuant to call published in THE DEMOCRAT, the democrats of Center township met in convention at the court house, in Plymouth, Saturday, June 27th, 2 o'clock, p. m., for the purpose of selecting and instructing delegates to attend the county convention.
