All of these gentlemen are now bankers and in addition we have Governor Baker, Colonel R. W. Thompson, General James Veatch, Judge L. Q. De Gruber, and, indeed, all the prominent radicals of the state, who, in 1854 and 1855, were rampant know nothings.—Indiana State Sentinel.

—There is an impression among many that a person of foreign birth must be naturalized before he can vote for president. This is a great mistake. Any male person who was not born in the United States, who will go to the office of the clerk of the court, and declare his intention to become a citizen, can vote for both president and governor if he has resided twelve months in the United States, six months of which have been in this state. Let all persons who are not native born citizens go at once to the clerk's office and declare his intention.

—The government has in the last year paid clerks \$886,559 for dealing out food furnished by the government for idle negroes. At the same time hundreds of white workingmen and their families suffered for the common necessities of life. They were not cared for by government agents. Bread, meat, and clothing were not provided for them. Why should white men be overlooked, neglected, and negroes pampered, petted and kept in idleness? If the toilers of the north wish a change in this particular, they must vote for Seymour and Blair.

—In 1856, when Buchanan was elected president, the republicans carried Vermont by 29,000 majority. Now, on a much larger vote, they have only 27,000. The Fremonters crowd them just as the Granters will crowd now. Let the radicals crowd and the radicals cackle, if they choose. Seymour and Blair are to be our next president and vice president.
