Good Advice.

The Democratic Central Executive Committee of Texas have published an address to the people of that State, from which we quote as follows:

Never, in all our troubles, have we been called upon, as now, to forbear, and yield to the forms of law, notwithstanding the Radical wrongs and outrages. Every consideration dear to men appeals to you not to give way to emotions of anger and resentment, but to bear with manly fortitude the evils that press upon us.

We invoke you, citizens, to prevent any conflict between the people and the authorities, if you can. If the military forces among you make arrests, do not resist. Submit to their authority even through you may believe they are but the instruments which the Radical party uses to drive you to extremity. The soldiers do not act of their own will, but execute orders which they are bound to obey.

Citizens, it is manly, it is noble and generous, it is an act of the purest patriotism, to endure evils when thereby you accomplish great results for the common good.

It is the purpose of the Radicals to force you to bear the punishment between you and the military. On the accomplishment of this depends their success in the Presidential election and their continuance in power.

Citizens, defeat them! In the name of all the good people of Texas, defeat them! In the name of our women and children who have suffered so much, defeat them! Be not driven into even apparent wrong. This reign of terror will soon be over, if we are but wise and true to the best interests of the country.

It is known that you are law-abiding that you would have the laws executed; that you would have right and justice extended to every man. Let us, then, bear the punishment without violence. Unite with one another, and determine that you will not under any circumstances through which brave men can live engage in or countenance any violence. Let the Radicals slander—submit even to the most arbitrary arrests by the military, if such are made. The end is near. The night of oppression is passing. The new day is almost upon us. Be patient in these adverse times, brave to endure when wrongs come heaviest.

—Contrary to the published statements of newspapers, California will hold no state election, this year, in September. The legislature of that state, at its recent session passed a law providing that the annual state election, which has hitherto been held in September, shall be postponed this year and every other presidential year till the presidential election, so that both elections will this year take place on the same day in November.
