By the time she rose again assistance had arrived, and she was taken out, somewhat the worse for the scare and the quantity of water imbibed, but otherwise all right.

Last Saturday afternoon Plymouth was visited by one of the severest thunder storms ever witnessed in this section. The storm commenced at 1:30 p. m. and lasted about an hour. For twenty or thirty minutes the thunder was almost continuous, and the vivid flashes of lightning denoted too close a proximity of electric matter for comfort. Several telegraph poles shattered, a few trees struck, and a couple of horses stunned, are all the results of the storm so far as heard from.
