New corn of fair quality sold here this week for 65 cents a bushel.

Butter sold at 23 cents a pound this week, in Rensselaer.

Our grocers ask five cents each for fair sized heads of cabbage.

Onions sell from the wagons on our streets at 75 cents per bushel.

Heidleberger has cider to sell at 25 cents a gallon.

Apples sell on our streets at from 50 to 65 cents; good winter fruit is worth more.

A larger amount of wheat has been sown this fall in Jasper county than ever before.

The Methodist Quarterly Meeting will be commenced in Rensselaer next Saturday, by a sermon at 2 o'clock P.M. Rev. Mr. Hull, the Presiding Elder, is expected.

Mr. David H. Yeoman has our thanks for Indianapolis paper of 21st inst., containing an account of the terrible accident at the State Fair.

On the 30th of September, Mr. Samuel M. Mitchel and Miss Isabel Record, both of Gillam township, were married in the Dunlap House, Rensselaer, by Justice S. P. Howard.

Rev. Mr. Fishback, of Sturgis, Michigan, is expected to commence a series of lectures in Rensselaer next Friday night. Subject, Spiritualism and Spiritual Philosophy. The public are invited.

The surveyors employed by the Indianapolis, Delphi & Chicago Railroad company are within sight of town, and Judge Schermerhorn, Secretary of the company, and J. M.
