Under an act of the last Legislature, each incorporated town is a separate road district, and is entitled to its proportion of the taxes collected for road purposes. This year the proportion due Rensselaer is \$226.76, of which perhaps two-thirds may be collected. This sum properly expended, together with from two to four days' labor which the law provides may be required of each voter under fifty, ought to make our principal streets good the year round.

Several of our Remington friends were over here on Tuesday, armed and equipped for catching pike, salmon, cat, bass, red-horse and dog-fish, which plentifully abound in the limpid waters of the meandering Iroquois; but their eyes were dim and their hands unsteady and only a few unsuspecting little fishes were taken by these tyro Nimrods of the water. Our native sportsmen were more successful and numbers of four, five and six pound pike and salmon rewarded their greater skill.
