

THE GOVERNMENT'S PLAN FOR THE RELIEF OF CUBA.

Best informed unofficial sources in Washington is believed to be this government's plan for the relief and freedom of Cuba: The President and Secretary of War have decided upon the first order for troops to move on to Cuba. Five thousand men of the regular army now at Tampa have been selected for this work, and they will go to the island and establish a base of supplies.

The command will be composed of 4,000 infantry and 1,000 cavalry and artillery. The navy department has arranged a transport to take them to one of the ports on the southern coast of the island, and their departure will take place this week. The point of landing will be some place which can be well fortified, and will be used as a base of supplies, not only for our naval forces, but to feed the Cubans and aid the Cuban army.

Supplies for the Cubans will be sent to this point for distribution after the troops have been landed, and the place has been fortified.

Rear-Admiral Sampson will detail a couple of his ships to protect the command, and a large marine guard will be ordered to support the troops. The war department has not yet selected the officer to command the force of soldiers to be sent to Cuba.

It is understood that arrangements have been completed for establishing communication between such a base of supplies and General Gomez's army, which is being concentrated for the purpose of forming a junction. The hour of the departure of troops from Tampa will be determined only by the question of how fast it is possible to get the 5,000 men on transports and put them under a naval escort. A large quantity of military supplies and provisions for feeding the destitute within reach of and under the protection of the invading army and the army of Gomez, will be transported to the point selected as the base of supplies in Cuba. It is felt that a force of 5,000 men will be amply able to establish the base of supplies and to protect it from any force the Spanish could send against it.

As soon as the force has landed the way will be open to pour into the island all the supplies and munitions of war that can possibly be needed. The vessels which will be detailed from Sampson's fleet will be quite able to cover the landing of the troops from the transports. It is understood that the Cuban army, as fast as it can be assembled, will be provided with such arms, munition, clothing, provisions, horses and equipment as it needs, and be put into a condition for effective service.

After it has been determined how effective a force can be relied upon from Gomez it can be decided to what extent our own unacclimated soldiers will have to be called upon for service in Cuba. Starting with the regulars, the more seasoned soldiers will be first drawn upon for the army of invasion. The militia and raw recruits will be kept in camp as long as possible, to

allow them to become seasoned, and when the calls upon them begin careful selection will be made of those best suited for the sort of service for which reinforcements will be needed.

Our dispatches yesterday it was stated that the United States torpedo boat Somers was held at Falmouth, England, and would not be permitted to leave that harbor. A few days ago it was stated that the Albany was held at New Castle, England. These acts on the part of the English government would seem to be unfriendly toward us, but they are not. According to international law all vessels of belligerents must get out of neutral harbors within twenty-four hours after war has been declared. As the Albany and Somers were not in condition to leave the English harbors to do but to compel them to remain. They will probably not be allowed to leave during the present war.

Key West is one of these islands, located about ninety miles from the mainland and occupying almost a middle position between Florida and Cuba.
