Owing to the nature of my personal life I have not been able to make an active canvass for the nomination, but you may say that I am a candidate and will be in the race from this time on until the convention meets and selects the nominees."

It is understood that Mr. Roots wanted the joint senatorship for Fayette and Henry counties, but Henry would not consent to the arrangement. He thinks Henry is hogging things in the office line and he proposes to make the race for lieutenant-governor interesting.

## STORMY SCENE

## Close Vt. in Spanish Chamber of Deputies—Police Called In.

Madrid, Feb. 10.—A stormy scene occurred yesterday in the chamber of deputies during a discussion of the tax budget. The opposition proposed an amendment relative to an increase of octroi dues.

The minister of finance, Senor Villaverde, declared that if the amendment were carried he would resign.

The result of the vote was 100 to 92 for and 88 against the amendment.

This caused wild excitement, and the leader of the opposition reproached the minister of finance for having voted upon a question which he himself had declared a cabinet question.

The public joined in the uproar, taking sides with the factions on the door of the chamber. The police were called in to guard the lobbies.

## OVER AN EMBANKMENT

## Passenger Train Wrecked at Nestoria, Mich.—Two Injured.

Nestoria, Mich., Feb. 10.—A special Dulluth, South Shore and Atlantic passenger train, en route to Marquette for the night, ran off the track on a 15-foot embankment. Of the 40 passengers in the cars, all but two miraculously escaped unhurt. The injured, including two women, are Mrs. Raymond, Neogamie, and Traveling Engineer William Green, Marquette.

The train was just entering the station and was going very slowly when the accident occurred or the loss of life would have been appalling.

Some distance further along the embankment, the man may have been under the horses' hoofs and been kicked to death, but the officers believe murder has been committed.

Kankakee, Ill., Feb. 10.—Herman Goldman of Chicago has been found guilty of perjury in the Kankakee county court and sentenced to imprisonment on a Joliet. He is the last of a gang of Chicago men who undertook to swear away the life of Sidney King, an ignorant negro, for a \$750 reward offered for the murderer of Emil Chiniquy and wife at St. Anne, Ind., about two years ago.

Badly Injured Man.

Chesterfield, Ind., Feb. 10.—Peter Bronnenberg, a well known young year-old child, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Bowman of this city fell into a wash boiler containing hot water yesterday and before rescued was literally parboiled, dying shortly afterward. The child was alone in the room at the time, and his screams brought assistance.

INHERITANCE TAX

State of Cornelius Vanderbilt Trying to Evade New York Law.

New York, Feb. 10.—The will of the late Cornelius Vanderbilt was the subject of discussion in the surrogate courts yesterday when Surrogate Fitzgerald was asked to pass on the question of whether the \$500,000 created by William H. Vanderbilt, the father of the late Cornelius Vanderbilt, is subject to the payment of the inheritance tax. Surrogate Fitzgerald, after hearing argument, should be discontinued.
