SCHOOL ENUMERATION

Suggestions to Parents and Heads of Families as to Their Aiding the Enumerators.

The annual enumeration of children entitled to school privileges is now being taken in this city by the following persons who were appointed by the school board: Messrs. Frank Bavenport, Charles Hoerner, Joseph T. Gans and Dr. Dempsey. These are capable men and are making a careful canvass of the city.

This work in the city of Richmond is of great importance to our schools and the citizens in general, as upon the basis of this list of children the city draws her proportion of the state school fund with which to pay the entire corps of teachers next year.

Parents and heads of families or households are earnestly requested to give promptly and correctly the information required by these enumerators. This list should include every person between the ages of six and twenty-one years residing in the city of Richmond, and every such person omitted from this list reduces the school fund that we should properly draw from the state about \$3.00.

The new law concerning the enumeration is very exacting in its requirements, and those taking this list will need the prompt and cheerful assistance of all upon whom they call. The following quotation from the law will indicate to all the chief requirements of this work:

(a) The enumerators "shall list the names of parents, guardians, having charge of such children, male or female, and shall list the full names and give the age and sex of each child so enumerated. He shall secure the signature of either parent or guardian, head of family or person having charge of such child or children, certifying to the correctness of the same, or if this is impossible shall secure the signature of some responsible person who can certify to the correctness of the list."

(b) He shall include in such list such unmarried persons between six and twenty-one years of age as are dependent upon themselves and not under the charge of parents, guardians, or head of families and shall designate such persons in a separate list, giving the street and number of their residence."

This last provision includes all persons between six and twenty-one who are working in the city as servants, clerks, bookkeepers, or other employees, if this be their home. The law further provides "that in case any parent, guardian or head of family or person having charge of any child entitled to school privileges shall refuse to report to the enumerator any facts herein required, necessary to a full and correct enumeration, he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined not less than one dollar nor more than ten."

Citizens who report the list of persons in their home to the enumerator frequently omit to give the names of young people who are working, or are away from home at school or visiting.

All our citizens can readily see the great importance of this work being accurately and honestly done, and most respectfully urge upon all that they cheerfully and promptly give to the enumerators when called upon all the information required.
