AN IDEAL SUMMER TRIP

The Pan-American Buffalo Line Offers Special Attractions for a Vacation Outing.

The Pan-American Exposition at Buffalo will be a big attraction to summer tourists the coming season. It opens in Buffalo, N. Y., May 5th.

The Pan-American Buffalo Line—Akron Route will be open May 5th with through passenger service from St. Louis, Indianapolis, Louisville, Cincinnati, Dayton, a d Columbus via Akron and Chautauqua Lake to Buffalo. This new line will take passengers through to the Pan-American Exposition on every day.

Deputy Minister of Marine Gourdeau of Ottawa has declared that the service will be adopted by him as soon as possible.

SUBMARINE SIGNALING.

Great Possibilities Predicted For System Developed at Boston.

A SUCCESSFUL TEST REPORTED.

It is asserted that the signal can be heard over a distance of ten miles for protection of vessels—British interested—signal bell to be placed at mouth of the St. Lawrence.

The interest manifested by the British government in the system of submarine signaling controlled by Boston men, together with the announcement that the first bell to be attached to a buoy will be placed at the mouth of the St. Lawrence river, is causing much comment among persons who profess to see great possibilities for this invention, says the New York Herald.

The assertion is made that it has been clearly demonstrated that signaling can be carried on over a distance of ten miles. Plans are now being made to put the system into practical operation. That the Canadian government has taken hold of the system is due to Henry M. Whitney, brother of the former secretary of the navy, who is president of the company controlling the invention. He is also president of the Boston Signal Co., the concern the vessels of which are in constant danger at the mouth of the St. Lawrence river. Signaling bells have been placed in Boston almost daily for the benefit of persons interested in the invention. Mr. Blount, the British consul at Boston, early notified his government about the invention. Captain Lewis Bayley, R. N., British naval attaché, was directed to investigate it.

The scow Sea Bell, on which was the operating apparatus, a few days ago was anchored off Whithrop head. A large bell was lowered 20 feet into the water through a well in the bottom of the scow. The first test was made at a distance of 100 yards. The bell was operated from the deck of the Sea Bell by an electrical machine which controlled the tongue of the bell.

The receiver, with its 12 "cars" was dropped overboard from a vessel to a depth of about 12 feet. The company then went to the pilothouse, and by means of telephone receivers, one placed to each car, a strong sound was attained.

The proposed new statue of Queen Victoria will raise the number of London's statues of royal persons to 31. The city has 14 statues of statesmen and a dozen of soldiers.

The great Nile dam, which cost two years of labor and ten millions of money, is now completed, ready to redeem from famine which follows crop failure a fertile territory of 600,000 acres.

At four miles the sound came more rapidly and with the same vigor as in the previous tests. Those operating the bell had adopted another method of communication, the ringing being in strokes of two. Eight nautical miles out, or ten statute miles, the receiver was again lowered, and the sound heard resembled a short, sharp rap. It was more like striking with one's fist, somewhat muffled, but with distinctness.

When all had been satisfied that the bell could be heard, the vessel started to a point about three miles distant. With the exception that it lost a trifle of the metallic ring the sound was heard even more distinctly than when the vessel was a quarter of a mile away.

John W. Blounting of Elenton, N. C., who recently died, was known in the Old North State as the "King of the Lumbermen." He went to northeastern North Carolina from New Jersey 15 years ago and acquired the ownership of half a dozen sawmills in various counties, thousands of acres of timber lands and several small railroads.
