The big boiler is kept going with a cob fire, and the engineer, Louis Meyers, has been soaking the coals in coal oil to keep them hot, and they would burn at all. Investigation shows that some one has been pouring the oil out of the can and filling the can with water.  
In the case for selling diseased hogs at Dublin yesterday there were two important witnesses ill and the case could not come to trial. This is the second time the case has had to be postponed and the prosecutor says that at the next time he will either try the case or dismiss it and bring it again in one of the courts here so that the running about will have to be done by other parties, the delay being their fault and not his own.

The talk over the speculators in stocks in this city has again revived and while nothing is said of the losers, of whom there must have been some, the winners are being talked of considerably. There is report now that ten days ago a young man who was a novice, bought five different stocks on a venture. Every one of them went up and are still going up; and his speculation stands him \$10,000 to the good should he sell at this time. He is still holding for more.

**Boat Crew Lost.**  
Charleston, S. C., June 1.—Three fishing boats with a crew of fifteen were caught in a squall yesterday and are missing. It is believed the crews are lost. All are colored.

**1,800 Striking Machinists in Chicago.**  
Chicago, Ill., June 1.—Two hundred machinists in the South Chicago ship yards struck today. The total number of striking machinists is now more than 1,800.

**Fatal Towboat Explosion.**  
Pittsburg, Pa., June 1.—The towboat George S. Ross, owned by the Pittsburg Plate Glass company, is a total wreck by explosion today near Tarentum. Captain Kelly is missing and supposed to be killed. Three members of the crew are badly burned. One will probably die.

Washington, June 1.—It is officially admitted that Minister Loomis will not return to Venezuela. Mr. Loomis suffered in health at his unpopularity post. The president, moreover, is not disposed to expose him again to the attacks on him in Venezuela because of his execution of orders from the state department. Mr. Loomis, who is now in Europe seeking to recuperate, will be given another diplomatic position as soon as a suitable place can be found.

**Tree Had Overgrown Gun.**
