## FOR THE HOUSEWIFE

To Hold Flowers.

Great copper bowls of a shade autumn foliage, very antique in appearance, are the very loveliest and best sought flower holders. Tropical flowers of the variety of tawny orange, sited in scarlet, look gorgeous in one of these. Curiously shaped old jugs, but set of metal, too, set off the dull orb to the best advantage. Seemingly dull background afforded by the old metal throws out the beautiful tints of the flowers in Rembrandtesque effect.

It is said that the coral has a very inexpensive plant, by the way, is particularly pretty and suitable for a hanging basket. The foliage, dense and drooping itself, has a charming tinting of faint, silvery green. ## Bookstands.

Bookstands in pedestal form, with shelves beneath, represent the great output in what is known as mission furniture—that is, plain, dark colored wood modeled upon the lines of the furniture of the old Spanish missions of California. Bookstands in all probability were not included in the primitive furnishings of these missions, but for those who like the severe line and solid appearance of this class of furniture the bookstand will prove a desirable article. In a library or a den, in company with the roomy mission armchairs, it is particularly appropriate.

## In Cook's Domain.

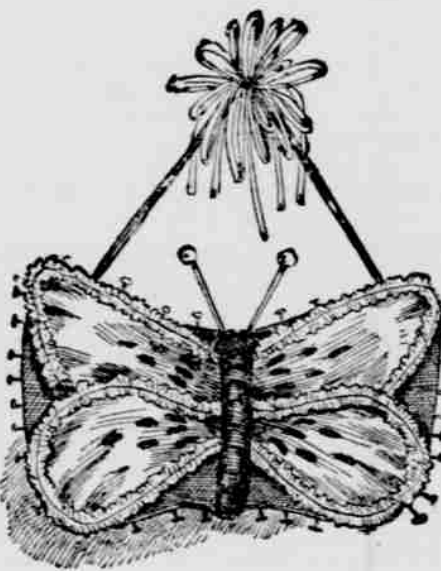
When poaching eggs, it is a good plan to put a teaspoonful of vinegar in the water. This sets the whites quickly and keeps the eggs in nice shape.

An English method of cooking beets is to bake them covered with a little hot water in the pan. When steamed tender, they are peeled, sliced and served with a little oil and a trifle of lemon juice.

If you by accident put too much salt in soup, sauce or vegetables, a pinch of sugar will serve to rectify matters.

## A Butterfly Pin cushion.

The pretty cushion is shown in its full size in the illustration. The foundation is made from two pieces of cardboard. These are each covered with a thin layer of wadding, then with silk.

green or any other rather dark color. Sew the edges of the two pieces together with silk. For the butterfly cut the four wings in yellow silk, sew fine wire round the edges, then trim with a ruche made of baby ribbon gathered in the center. The marks and shading on the wings should be painted in. For the body make a roll of wadding over a piece of wire, cover by winding black flosses closely round, join the four wings together and sew on the body over the joining; sew on two heads for eyes and stitch in pins for the antennae. Fix the butterfly on the cushion by a drop or two of mullage or a few stitches.

Sew a baby ribbon loop on each of the upper corners to hang it up by and ornament the top with a rosette.

## Helena Padding.

Boil one pint of milk, pour it over quarter of a pound of stale bread crumbs and allow it to soak for ten minutes; beat an ounce of butter with two ounces of moist sugar, one ounce of chopped candied peel and the yolks of two eggs; mix with the soaked crumbs, adding lightly to it the stiffly beaten whites of two eggs. Pour into a buttered pie dish, spread two tablespoonfuls of jam over and bake in a moderate oven for half an hour.

## To Clean Mahogany.

Mahogany needs to be merely wiped with a damp cloth, then rubbed for half an hour with a clean flannel. Brush the upholstered parts very hard, then wipe them quickly with a cloth wrung very dry out of clear, hot water. Follow this with a clean white flannel dipped in alcohol. As soon as the flannel shows dirt wash it clean in tepid water. Otherwise the alcohol will dissolve the dirt and deposit it in streaks upon the surface of the fabric.

## WASHINGTON LETTER

(Special Correspondence.)

The outlook for gardening and some agriculture in the cold region of Alaska along the Yukon is made quite encouraging by official reports received at the United States department of agriculture at Washington. Professor C. C. Georgeson, who is in charge of the Alaska experiment stations, has spent the summer in the interior and along the Yukon valley, visiting the experiment station established by the department of agriculture last year at Rampart, just outside the arctic circle, and other points where experiments were arranged for.

Good gardens were found all along the route, especially at Eagle City and Holy Cross Mission. Although the season was unusually late this year, new potatoes, cabbage, cauliflower, beets and other vegetables were ready for the table before the middle of August, and lettuce, radishes and turnips, grown in the open, had been in for some weeks. Flower gardens containing a large variety of annuals grown from seed furnished last year were in full bloom. At the station at Rampart rye seeded the previous fall wintered perfectly and was ripe in July. Spring seeded barley had ripened about the middle of August, and there was quite a prospect for oats and wheat to mature.

Extensive areas of excellent land were found on the lower Yukon upon which there was an abundant and often luxuriant growth of grass over six feet high. The abundant moisture and long days during the summer months account for the surprising luxuriance of vegetation in that far north region.

## Hard Work for the Police.

With the departure of the large number of distinguished persons who were the guests of Washington during the funeral ceremonies the police drew a deep sigh of relief and congratulated themselves that no untoward incident had marred the stay of the nation's great men in the national capital. Wherever there is anything out of the ordinary in progress in a large city there is always more or less danger to the important visitors, and upon the local police falls the duty of protecting them from harm. This is not always an easy matter, as in addition to the possibility of murderous attempts on the part of fanatics there is an almost general dislike of surveillance on the part of those to be protected for the great men of the nation are extremely averse to having a guard, either in uniform or in civilian clothes, and as their wishes are supposed to be consulted it requires a great deal of diplomacy and finesse to keep a watchful and protecting eye upon those who are to be guarded.

Pickpockets could easily have reaped a harvest in the crowd; but, much to the surprise of the police, not many cases of theft occurred. General James Longstreet of Georgia, United States commissioner of railroads, was relieved of his pocketbook, containing railroad passes and about \$100 in cash. He was entering the capitol in company with his wife when he was jostled by two young men. One of these men, it is believed, took the pocketbook from his hip pocket.

Minister Wu on Anarchists. Minister Wu Ting Fang called at the treasury department the other day to see about the cases of two Chinese students who were detained at San Francisco because they did not have certificates signed by the American consul at the port from which they sailed.

Assistant Secretary Taylor told Mr. Wu that it was impossible to admit any Chinese who did not have the required certificates from the American consul. Mr. Wu accepted his defeat gracefully.

"I think the government ought to pass laws excluding anarchists rather than Chinamen," he said good humoredly. "The Chinese are law abiding people, anyway. You ought to deport all anarchists and pass laws making it high treason to attack the life of either the president, the vice president or any cabinet officer, senator or congressman."

## No Official Gaiety the Coming Winter.

If the precedents set by President Arthur are followed by President Roosevelt, the coming winter will be entirely devoid of official gaiety in Washington. The official mourning will extend over six months and will be rigorously observed. The official mourning will end on March 14, 1902, and as this date falls after Shrove Tuesday the official social season will be allowed to lapse. Therefore the New Year's reception of 1903 will in all probability be the first formal gathering of the official and social world at the White House. This period of mourning is observed strictly. All stationery used at the White House is deeply bordered in black, as is also the stationery at the state department. The other branches of the government will not observe this requirement. The president's visiting cards and the cards of the cabinet will also be black bordered.

## Movements of Naval Vessels.

The Philadelphia has sailed from Astoria for San Francisco. The Marietta has arrived at Tompkinsville from Manila. The Buffalo has arrived at Christiania. The Saturn has sailed from Cavite for Nagasaki and the Nanshan from Yokohama for Chefoo. The Atlanta has sailed from Pernambuco for Macao. The Chicago has arrived at Genoa. The Alert has sailed from Bremerton for San Diego.

There is some talk of fitting up the attic of the White House, a most commodious place, as a sort of indoor playground and exercise room for President Roosevelt's children.
