## M'KINLEY'S NAME

Will Be Fittingly Honored By the United States Congress.

### FORMAL ACTION TAKEN

Resolutions Looking to a Formal Day Devoted to Eulogy Have Been Adopted.

Initial Indications Point to a Easy Time Ahead of LVIIth Congress.

Washington, Dec. 3.—Resolutions respecting the late President McKinley were introduced in the house of representatives by Representative Grosvenor today, simultaneously with the introduction by Mr. Foraker in the senate, of the same resolutions, based upon which committees were appointed to arrange for a formal memorial service at a date yet to be announced. The reading of the president's message, a lengthy document, was received with formal attention in both branches.

That congress will have a busy session is demonstrated by the number of measures already introduced. It is estimated by officials of the house that over 3,000 bills have already been introduced. There was much rivalry for the honor of having Bill No. 1, no less than 15 members having asked for this precedence. The indications

are that the bill of Mr. McCleary restricting the sale of oleomargarine will be so designated when the records are made up. The bills took a wide range; the Pacific cable bills, by Representative Sherman of New York; Corliss of Michigan, and Jones of Washington, gave varying phases of this project. Mr. Jones proposing the northern route via Puget sound, with an appropriation of \$8,000,000. Mr. Corliss proposing a government built and maintained route, and Mr. Sherman offering the plan allowing private participation in the enterprise.

The opening day of the first session in the house of representatives furnished a spectacle that delighted the crowded galleries. The machinery of the house is cumbersome, and is set in motion by a laborious process, but the spectators yesterday evidently did not consider it tedious, as they clung to their places through the entire proceedings, which lasted four and one-half hours, probably half the time being consumed in the monotonous calling of the roll. The organization of the house was accomplished according to time-honored precedents. Speaker Henderson was sworn in by General Bingham, the "father of the house," and after delivering a very graceful speech in recognition of the honor bestowed upon him he in turn administered the oath to the members elect. The usual committees were appointed to inform the president and the senate that the house was organized and ready to do business, a committee of three, consisting of Messrs. Payne, Bingham and Richardson was appointed to join a similar committee of the senate and wait upon the president and inform him that congress was ready to receive any communication he might have to make, the rules of the last house were adopted after a slight jar, and then the biennial seat drawing occurred. This latter ceremony was robbed of much of its interest by the fact that under the new arrangement of seats there are more than enough to go round, and those whose names are drawn last do not suffer as they did on former occasions. The lower show which is the greatest feature of opening day, was not as imposing as usual. More flowers than ever before were sent to members, but after the seat drawing the house adjourned before a third of them were brought into the hall.

### GOING OVER TO BURN.

Findlay, O., Dec. 3.—One hundred and fifty window glass workers of Findlay yesterday deserted the anti-Burns faction of the national organization and returned to the Simon Burns wing of that body. The move has caused a sensation in labor circles, as this has been a hotbed of opposition to Burns.

### REACHED AN AGREEMENT.

Copenhagen, Dec. 3.—A full agreement has been reached between Denmark and the United States for the sale of the Danish West India.

### A SERIOUS STRUGGLE

Germany in the Midst of a Severe Internal Conflict.

Berlin, Dec. 3.—Count Von Buelow, the imperial chancellor, in introducing the greatest parliamentary struggle that Germany has ever faced, yesterday counseled the members of the reichstag to moderation of language in the present tariff discussions, declaring that the eyes of the world were upon them. Although this was Germany's affair, said Count Von Buelow, it was necessary to maintain a resolute front to the other nations of the world.

Allusion was made to the United States in the course of the debates on the subject, and the name "America" is likely to be yet more freely used by both sides to this controversy, which is moving Germany more deeply than has any other civil question since the emergence of the empire. The tariff experiences of the United States and the pressure of American competition constitute rich material for argument upon either side of the question.

"Brotwucher" (bread usury) or the raising of the price of bread, is to be the battleword of the manufacturing capitalists and the Socialists alike, who by a curious turn of politics, now unite in passionate opposition to a bill that primarily increases the cost of foodstuffs. Every individual small interest throughout Germany that is adversely affected by the tariff bill is organized against this bill. Popular and irresponsible sentiment gathers around these compact and highly organized fighting units. This opposition to the measure is more powerful outside than inside the German parliament. While the government is aware and feels the opposition, it also recognizes and sees that the present period of industrial calamity in Germany is an inopportune time to press a measure raising the cost of food. The government is so pledged to the agrarian party, so fully committed to the measure, that it feels it cannot recede therefrom or postpone its consideration. Consequently the ministry entered upon the debate yesterday determined to see the thing through, but with no cheerfulness of spirit. It is believed that Germany is about to enter upon as intense a period of political disturbance as existed in Great Britain during the corn law agitation.

### The Landanum Route.

Toledo, O., Dec. 3.—Wilbur Clarke, for the past five years telegraph editor of the Times, committed suicide yesterday by taking landanum. Last August while employed on a Buffalo paper Clarke was married to Miss Valeria Kriehoff of Detroit, but owing to her parents' objections she never lived with Clarke. Despondency due to his domestic troubles induced Clarke to take his own life. He was 27 years of age and had worked on papers in Detroit, New York and Kansas City.

### Pathetic Hunting Incident.

Steffo was shot and instantly killed yesterday at her home on Springlake creek, about three miles from here, and Harry Kimball is probably mortally wounded. He was starting hunting, and it is supposed, shot Miss Steffo accidentally, then committed suicide. They were second cousins and the best of friends.

### Student Commits Suicide.

Louisville, Ky., Dec. 3.—Fulton B. Harris, a student at the Louisville dental college, committed suicide yesterday afternoon at Eastern Park by shooting himself. He left letters to his mother and to a young woman at Carlisle, Ky., which, however, did not explain his act, though they indicated low spirits.

### Charges Not Sustained.

Auckland, N. Z., Dec. 3.—The United States naval court at Tutuila, Samoa, has honorably acquitted Captain Benjamin F. Tilley, the naval governor of Tutuila, of all the charges against him. No evidence to sustain these charges was presented to the court.

### Must Tell the Truth.

St. Louis, Dec. 3.—The validity of an insurance policy depends on the truthful answer to question propounded by the company when application for insurance is made, according to an opinion handed down by the United States court of appeals.

### Cleveland Convalescing.

Princeton, N. J., Dec. 3.—Ex-President Cleveland is still gaining strength, and it is but a question of a few days before he will be able to take his daily drive.

### TERSE TELEGRAMS

King Edward will go to Cannes this winter. A man believed to be Pat Crowe has been arrested in Montana.

A Coal Creek non-union miner's house was destroyed by dynamite. Three cargoes of arms are about to leave Hamburg for South America.

The condition of Henrik Isen, the Norwegian novelist, is declared to be hopeless. American interests are said to have purchased a big Liverpool shipping company.

Gondie, the Liverpool bank clerk, alleged to have participated in the recent robbery, has been arrested. After the session of the supreme court on Monday a recess will be taken for four weeks, the court to reconvene on Jan. 6.

The Governor of the Panama says Colombia needs help to maintain free transit across the isthmus, and that the rebellion will soon be suppressed.

The military authorities have sentenced to death two more Filipinos for atrocious murder. Diego de Gusman, an insurgent captain, and Feliciano Borja an insurgent, were executed.

The monthly statement of the public debt shows that at the close of business November 30, the debt, less cash in the treasury, amounted to \$1,612,000,445, a decrease for the month of \$11,500,012.
