Monogram Sofa Pillows.
So much money has been expended on sofa cushions, so much beautiful embroidery and handsome brocade have been used and wasted, that it is now the chic thing to have sofa cushions covered in a perfectly plain double square of denim or twilled cotton material. The edges are either bordered with silk or velvet ribbon or bound with bands of the denim. The fad is to work your crest in very large, coarse letters. The embroidery may take up nearly the entire front of the cushion, leaving just space for a scroll pattern or vine in the same rough crested stitch for a border. Simple denim and linen covers have quite taken the place of silks, satins and brocades.

Brass and Copper.
Brass and copper articles, such as fenders, fire irons, etc., should be rubbed with a little sweet oil and finely powdered rottenstone, then polished with a leather. If, however, they are in a very bad state, the following paste should be used: One ounce oxalic acid, six ounces rottenstone, half ounce gum arabic, made into a little paste with one ounce sweet oil and a little water. Rub on with a piece of flannel, then polish with a soft cloth and a leather.

The Hall of the Present.
The tendency of the present day is to treat the hall not as a hall, but as a sitting room, with easy chairs, tables, lamps, bookcases and all the appointments of a library, an arrangement which has undoubtedly a certain picturesqueness and originated when in the reaction against the discomfort and ugliness of forty or fifty years ago attention was turned to the old colonial and English houses.

Table Decoration.
