

ONLY EIGHT WIVES

This Man Certainly Had More Than His Share of Trouble.

NOW UNDER ARREST

John Scott Admits Matrimonial Alliance With Eight Women Since 1892 and No Divorces.

Remarkable Story From Evansville of Bigamy Extraordinary On Part of Real Estate Man.

Evansville, Ind., Jan. 15.—John Scott, known under the names of Howard and Donnell, was arrested at Uniontown, Ky., on the charge of bigamy and has confessed his guilt. Scott is a real estate man. In 1892 he married Miss Julia K. Frost at Springfield, Ark. He lived with her a few months and, it is alleged, after getting a farm, left her. He was next heard from in Tennessee, where he married Mrs. Salie Corder, near Paris, and afterward deserted her. Three other wives he claimed after this time were Mrs. Pearl Sutton of Mobile, Ala.; Mrs. Mary A. Gott of Ruddyville, Ky., and Mrs. Jane Mattingly of Bowling Green, Ky. The names of his three other wives he refuses to give. Scott's scheme, it is said, was to claim he was a banker with large holdings in New York and London.

MANY MEN WANTED

Recruiting Station Ready For Business On Large Scale. Evansville, Ind., Jan. 15.—Captain Arthur Johnson of the local recruiting station has received word from the war department to recruit all the men he can for service in the Philippines. He will establish substations in southern Illinois and place a man in charge of them. Captain Johnson says the war department will demand 50,000 recruits during the year and he fears, owing to the prosperous condition of the country, that they will be hard to get. About 36,000 men will be retired from the army this year.

Willing to Drop the Case.

North Judson, Ind., Jan. 15.—Six hundred prominent taxpayers of the county have signed a petition asking the prosecutor to dismiss the grand jury indictment against ex-County Treasurer George Lightcap, charging

the money to be outstanding debts, expecting to convert his property into cash and reimburse the treasury. He has paid part of the shortage and his bondsmen have settled in full with the county.

Dynamiters at Work. Petersburg, Ind., Jan. 15.—The store belonging to Messrs. Shoulders and Skinner at Arthur, this county, was entered by burglars and the safe was forced with dynamite, and money in excess of \$75 was carried off. The force of the explosion tore out the window and broke several panes of glass in adjoining buildings. Mr. Shoulders was awakened and reached the street in time to see the burglars driving in the direction of Oakland City in a buggy. Nothing in the store was molested.

Will Raise the Price.

Washington, Ind., Jan. 15.—The coal miners' strike at Ragsley was settled yesterday and the men returned to work today. The men struck last week for the Indiana scale of wages and the operators of the three mines have agreed to pay the scale and allow for removal of deadfall. The price of coal will be raised to meet the increase of wages.

Position Accepted.

Lafayette, Ind., Jan. 15.—Prof. W. Goldsborough of the electrical department at Purdue university, has forwarded to the executive committee of the St. Elou's Word's Fair association his acceptance of the appointment as chief of the department of electrical exhibits. He will spend the year in St. Louis.

An In-actual Haul.

Richmond, Ind., Jan. 15.—Several nights ago the safe in the office of McConaha & Parrott of Centerville was forced by burglars and a package of \$6,700 of notes was carried off. The package was afterward thrown away by the burglars and was found about a mile distant.

The Petition Denied.

Indianapolis, Jan. 15.—The application made by attorneys for John Rinkard, sentenced to be hanged for murder, for the appointment of an insanity inquest for Rinkard, has been denied by the supreme court on the ground that the court does not have original jurisdiction.

IT IS NOW SETLED
Representatives to the Coronation
Have Been Appointed.

Washington, Jan. 15.—The secretary of state has announced the names of the following persons, who are to be special representatives of the United States government at the coronation of King Edward:

Special Ambassador—Whitelaw Reid of New York.

Representative of the United States Army—General James H. Wilson of Delaware.

Representative of the United States Navy—Captain Charles E. Clark, commander of the battleship Oregon during the Spanish-American war and now governor of the naval home at Philadelphia.

There are to be three secretaries, as follows: J. P. Morgan Jr., son of J. Pierpont Morgan of New York; Edmund Lincoln Ballou, a barrister, of New York, and William Wetmore, son of Senator Wetmore of Rhode Island.

Mr. Choate, our ambassador to London, who sailed yesterday for his post, will not, strictly speaking, have any official connection with the special embassy. This was the fact during the golden jubilee, when Ambassador Hay was not even ex-officio a member of the special representation of the United States government. As a matter of fact, however, the United States ambassador is a very important figure in the ceremonies and is in almost every instance attendant upon all the functions in which the special representatives participate.

IMPORTANT SURRENDER
Insurgents In Taal Voluntarily Lay Down Their Arms.

Manila, Jan. 15.—The full surrender of the forces of General Marisigan, who with General Cabrera and a renegade priest named Castillo, gave themselves unconditionally, Jan. 1, to General Bell, who is conducting the campaign against the insurgents in Batangas province, occurred yesterday at Taal. The insurgents created a surprise by bringing in 60 more rifles than the authorities thought Marisigan could command in the district of Taal which he controlled. The Filipinos surrendered included three colonels, one major, five captains and 12 lieutenants. They gave up 219 rifles and one cannon. All the insurgents who surrendered did so unconditionally. General Bell ordered the men to be released. Colonel Marisigan says he can prevail on many more men to surrender during the next few days, and also obtain possession of a number of additional rifles. General Bell says the surrender pacifies for the time being all the eastern part of Batangas.

Whittaker Is Missing.

Frankfort, Ky., Jan. 15.—The chief witness in the trial of James Howard, an alleged gospel suspect, was the disappearance of Wesley Whittaker, a Clay county barber, who came here Monday night to testify for the commonwealth. Whittaker spent the night here but left on an early morning train and efforts to locate him have been unsuccessful. It is said Whittaker would have testified that he saw Howard the night before he came to Frankfort and that his testimony would show whether Howard wore mustache at that time. This is an important issue in the case. The prosecution claims that Whittaker's disappearance is due to intimidation and it is said that he went to Indiana

A High Altitude. Berlin, Jan. 15.—The meteorologists Berzon and Elias, who ascended in a balloon during a high wind last Thursday, to try for the long distance record, write from a village of southern Russia in the government of Poltava, that they made 868 miles in 29 hours. They say the wind slackened and that their travels were mostly above the clouds. The high altitude reached was 16,250 feet. The aeronauts failed to beat Count de la Vaulx's long distance record of 1,116 miles.
