Kiss Pudding—Boil one quart sweet milk in custard kettle, stir into it four heaping tablespoonfuls sugar, and four level tablespoonfuls corn starch dissolved in a little cold water or milk and added to the well beaten yolks of four eggs. Have the whites of the eggs beaten to a stiff froth with a cup of sugar and a teaspoonful of vanilla, spread on top of pudding, set in a quick oven and brown; take out, sprinkle with cocoanut; serve cold after three or four hours. The sweet liquor which settles to the bottom in cooling, serves as a sauce.

Bohemian Cream—One quart of cream, two tablespoonfuls of sugar, one ounce of gelatine, dissolved. Whip half the cream to a stiff froth. Boil the remainder with the sugar and season with vanilla; add the gelatine, and when cooled a little, the well beaten yolks of four eggs. Beat until it begins to stiffen, then beat in quickly, the whipped cream. Pour in wet molds and set on ice.
