A SORROWING PARTY

Of Hoosiers Will Attend Senator Hanna's Funeral.

Indianapolis, Feb. 17.—A party of prominent Hoosiers will attend the funeral of Senator Hanna at Cleveland, Friday. Gov. Durbin is going and will probably be accompanied by several members of his staff. Chairman Goodrich of the Republican state committee will leave sometime Thursday for Cleveland. National Committeeman Harry S. New, who was a member of the executive committee of the national organization and one of Senator Hanna's very close political friends is going to Cleveland tomorrow. He would have gone on to Washington but the time is too short. District Attorney Keating and several state officials will probably be members of the governor's party enroute to Cleveland. The special meeting of the Republican state committee which was to have been held this week has been postponed until next week because of the death of Senator Hanna.

Party leaders are beginning to feel that national politics is being played now in Indiana inasmuch as the delegates are being selected to the Republican national convention. The selection of the delegates, however, is not fraught with so much interest as was promised several months ago when there was a prospect of opposition to President Roosevelt. So far as his chances are concerned the selection of the delegates will be a mere formality but it will open an interesting vista of speculation as to who is to be elected national committeeman. Harry S. New is confident that the two delegates selected yesterday by the Twelfth district are for him for national committeeman. He is more active than his opponent Charles L. Henry but the outcome of the race is naturally much in doubt as but two of the thirty delegates are known.

On the face of returns up to this time J. Frank Hanly of Lafayette has the best of his opponents in the race for the Republican nomination for governor. In addition to Hamilton, Howard and Starke counties it is now stated that he has a clear majority of two-thirds of the Rush county delegation, although a very stiff fight was put up there for W. L. Taylor by Judge Henly of the Appellate court and other well known politicians who are for the Indianapolis candidate. The result of the primaries so far has caused Hanly's stock to rise but the Montgomery county delegates will be named this week and it is said that every one of them will be for Taylor which in a measure equalizes things between the two men who are generally regarded as the leaders of the race.

The Ninth district will break the ice and hold the first congressional convention. Chairman Sims who is also secretary of the state committee, has issued a call for the Republicans to meet at Frankfort, Feb. 23, a week from Thursday. Charles B. Landis will be renominated for congress without opposition. Sometime ago there was talk of opposition to him but he will get the place by acclamation. Delegates to the national convention will not be selected before the middle of March but it is very probable that the convention will adopt a rousing Roosevelt resolution as Congressman Landis is one of the most enthusiastic Roosevelt men in Indiana.

There were 3,177 deaths in Indiana in January, a death rate of 14.8 to each thousand. In January 1902 the number of deaths was 2,910, a rate of 13.8. There were 400 deaths from consumption and nearly 600 from pneumonia. The deaths in nearly all average diseases were more numerous during the last month than usual for the time of year, probably owing to the long and severe winter. In speaking of the number of deaths from consumption the bulletin issued by the state board of health asks the question whether it is not about time for the legislature to do something to reduce the horrible mortality.

Evansville's Serious Plight.

Evansville, Ind., Feb. 17.—Ice in the river has put out of service one of the pump boats furnishing water to the city auxiliary pumping station, and with the new works closed down the city has barely any pressure, the water not even being forced through faucets on first floors. Many people are hauling water. Lack of water has shut off street car traffic, and the company will have to haul water to supply the boilers. In case of fire the city will be practically helpless.

Admiral Cotton's Retirement.

Washington, Feb. 17.—Announcement is made at the navy department of the retirement at his own request of Rear Admiral Charles S. Cotton, commander-in-chief of the European station. Rear Admiral Cotton's request to be retired was because of the continued ill health of his wife. Rear Admiral Chadwick will succeed him.

Big Fire at St. Louis.

St. Louis, Feb. 17.—The four-story building at Fifteenth and Poplar streets, occupied by the Belle Hickey Showcase Manufacturing company and the Brooks, Goodfellow Shoe Manufacturing company, was destroyed by fire. The loss is estimated at \$125,000.

Natives Attack German Outpost.

Berlin, Feb. 17.—A dispatch from Okahandja, German Southwest Africa, says that in an outpost skirmish near Seels, east of Windhoek, the German column marching to the relief of Windhoek lost three men killed and had two men wounded.

DR. AMADOR ELECTED

First President of Panama Republic Had No Opposition.

Panama, Feb. 17.—Dr. Manuel Amador was unanimously elected first president of the first republic of Panama yesterday. Dr. Pablo Arosemena, Domingo Obaldia and Dr. Carlos Men-

dona were elected to fill respectively the positions of first, second and third designados or vice-presidents. Great preparations are being made for the inauguration of the president which will take place on Feb. 20.

The Ruling Was Modified.

Havana, Feb. 17.—Officials of the National Bank of Cuba which is handling the collections of interest for the American holders of Cuban revolutionary bonds, conferred with the secretary of the treasury. The treasurer readily agreed to modify the extra identification requirements, and a new ruling is expected to be issued, under which the interest will be payable to bearers of coupons in accordance with the original conditions of the bonds.

Kansas Joint Smasher Punished.

Topeka, Kan., Feb. 17.—Blanche Boies has been sentenced to serve thirty days in jail and pay a fine of \$100 for her second offense in smashing the windows of buildings in which joints were operating a year ago. Miss Boies smashed the windows of five buildings. She had been serving a thirty-day sentence for smashing the first windows of the series of five. That sentence expired Saturday.

Found Rest in the Wave.

Miami, Fla., Feb. 17.—Suffering from a recent attack of illness and enroute home, Louis E. Sears, of the Sears Shoe company, of New York city, committed suicide by jumping from the steamship Martinique, twenty-five miles off the Florida coast. The Martinique was stopped as soon as possible but no trace of Sears' body could be discovered.

Costly Blaze in Minneapolis.

Minneapolis, Minn., Feb. 17.—One of the biggest fires that ever visited this city started last night in the printers exchange building, a six-story brick structure, gutting the entire interior and incurring a loss of over \$120,000.

An Army Officer's Suicide.

Washington, Feb. 17.—First Lieut. George D. Jarrett, Second Infantry, is dead at Ft. Logan, Col., from wounds self inflicted while suffering from a temporary attack of dementia.
