A great deal of unnecessary and mischievous nonsense has been written about Ibsen. The fact that much of it was well intended only added to the baleful influence. Like many original and aggressive propagandists, Dr. Ibsen has suffered most in the house of his friends. He has been a rallying point for any number of strange people, who confounded their own queerism with his originality and who, because his point of view was sane, fresh and in many significant respects almost isolated, thought it identical with their erratic and unsteady outlook upon life.

These people are adepts at reading meanings into a work of genius, and Ibsen, who of all modern writers is singularly capable of disclosing his own meanings without any body's assistance, has been their special prey. His plays, which have the clarity and symmetry of a geometrical proposition, have been pulled and hauled, twisted and misinterpreted by these volunteer commentators until they have become a weariness and a byword to many sensible people, who look with suspicion upon a writer whose exposition of certain fundamental problems in human life requires such a vast amount of elucidation from without.

Taking their own cue in a way from these over zealous friends of Ibsen, his enemies have also read meanings into his works that are impossible for the playgoer who has no preconceived notions in the matter to discover when he calmly reads one of the dramas or, what is better, sees it acted. He finds that he is swiftly absorbed in a narrative which is unfolded with almost primitive simplicity, but which in its close adherence to logic, reasonableness and coherence betrays the hand of a master craftsman. When he comes into this realization he is put out of conceit with the meddlesomeness of the volunteer commentators who have done so much to befog Dr. Ibsen's meanings.

He also discovers that there are in Ibsen's exposition of the problems of human life no compromises with vice, no incitements to loose thinking, no affront to the loftiest and severest ideals of virtue, but that there is a merciless exposure of hypocrisy and a scornful analysis of certain dreary conventionalities, which have taken on the sanctity of sound moral law.
