## ICE IS GOING OUT

Affairs in the Far East Now  
Promise a Little More  
Action.

### MERCHANTS PROTEST

Restriction of Trading Facilities  
Further Compromise the Rights  
of Neutral Countries.

Russian Authorities Base It, How-  
ever, on Ground of Military  
Necessity.

New Chwang, March 26.—The Liao  
river became navigable yesterday  
and shipping agents have received  
notices of the departure of vessels  
from ports along the entire coast of  
China for New Chwang.

The Russian military authorities  
have issued an order regulating ship-  
ping at this port. The order provides  
that all incoming vessels must anchor  
five and one-half miles below the fort  
and can proceed into the harbor only  
between the hours of 6 a. m. and 6 p.  
m., after undergoing an examination  
of papers and cargo.

The merchants here are protesting  
against the order in the hope that  
ships will be permitted to anchor  
within two miles of the foreign settle-  
ment before submitting to an examina-  
tion of the authorities.

Although further compromising the  
rights of neutrals the surveillance of  
all ships passing by the fortifications  
is considered by the authorities to be  
a necessary military precaution.

### BATTLE IMMINENT

Opposing Forces Are Taking Each  
Other's Measure.

London, March 26.—A dispatch  
from Ping Yang, Korea, says that re-  
turns to the Japanese intelligence de-  
partment show that 4,500 Cossacks  
of the Russian infantry crossed the  
Yalu river from Antung during the  
last five days. Three thousand Rus-  
sians are holding Anju, Korea, and  
1,000 are at a strategic point on the  
Korean bank of the Yalu, and the re-  
turns also state that 500 members of  
the Russian infantry and Cossacks  
proceeded southward and now occu-  
py Chun-Ju, Korea. The Russians  
are reported to be holding the north  
bank and the Japanese the south bank  
of the Anju river, where the latter  
have thrown up intrenchments.

The hostile forces are thus face to  
face, and desultory shots have al-  
ready been exchanged. Thus far  
there have been few casualties. A St.  
Petersburg dispatch says that General  
Altavater, inspector of artillery for  
the Russian army, has been banished  
to a remote military post, because the  
new quick-firing guns which Altavater  
informed the czar would be ready in  
three months cannot be on hand be-  
fore the year is over. When the czar  
demanded an explanation, Altavater  
replied that he had said nothing fur-  
ther regarding the matter, as he feared  
to bother his majesty with details.

### For Prisoners of War.

St. Petersburg, March 26.—A special  
commission of the foreign office, un-  
der the presidency of Prof. Martens,  
professor of international law at the  
University of St. Petersburg, is draw-  
ing up regulations for the treatment  
of prisoners of war. The commission  
is doing its utmost to render the regu-  
lations as humane as possible. They  
will be based substantially on those  
in force at the time of the Russo-  
Turkish war.

### Long Trip of Troops.

Vladivostok, March 26.—The troops  
arriving here are in good health and  
spirits, weather-beaten faces, but the  
cases with frost-bitten faces, but the

only other indications of their 7,000-  
mile journey are their fur coats and  
felt boots, which they brought with  
them, though no longer necessary, as  
spring is setting in, with sunny days.

### DRIVEN OUT BY FIRE

Hardships Experienced by Patients in  
Michigan Hospital.

Escanaba, Mich., March 26.—In a  
fire at the Delta county hospital, over  
sixty patients, suffering from almost  
every imaginable disease, were thrown  
into a panic, and many were forced  
to leave the building dressed only in  
their night clothes. Many of the  
frightened patients, who were thought  
to be at the point of death, arose  
from their beds and escaped from the  
building by ladders and fire escapes.  
Many stood about the outside of the  
building nearly thirty minutes dressed  
only in their night clothes and in  
snow up to their knees before they  
could be taken to near-by homes.  
The fire was under control within an  
hour.

### He Thanked the Judge.

Toledo, O., March 26.—Albert Fish-  
er, recently convicted of the murder  
of William Marshall, a bartender, was  
sentenced by Judge Tyler to be elec-  
trocuted on the morning of July 7.  
Fisher thanked the judge for his kind-  
ness, and fairness in the case.

### Cuban Municipal Scandal.

Havana, March 26.—Senor Del Pey,  
the municipal tax collector of Cienfu-  
gos, is being prosecuted for the embe-  
zlement of \$6,000 of the funds of that  
city.

### Paid the Extreme Penalty.

Union, Mo., March 26.—George Col-  
lins, bank robber, who was convicted  
of killing Detective Schumacher, in  
resisting arrest, was hanged here to-  
day. Collins yesterday testified in  
the trial of William Rudolph who is  
charged with participating in the mur-  
der of Schumacher.
