KINSHIN MARU SUNK.

(By Associated Press.)

Tokio, April 29.—Sventy three Japanese were drowned by the sinking of Kinshin Maru vessel which was lost with the torpedo boats in a fog. While the transport was sinking the soldiers fired into a Russian vessel and as Kinshin Maru sank several soldiers committed suicide. Three boats floated free from the wreckage saving 45 soldiers and nine passengers and the crew. Two captains and three lieutenants were among the drowned. The survivors got ashore and were conveyed to Gen San today.
