SWINDLER CAPTURED

WITH A DRAFT FOR \$10,000 WHICH WAS CASHED BY A PHILADELPHIA BANK

IMPOSTOR STOLE PAPERS

From Col. Hewitt, Whom He Impersonated—Latter's Son Discovered the Fraud.

New York, May 3.—A swindler has been operating two months here by representing himself as Col. John D. Hewitt, a prominent wealthy citizen of Bramwell, W. Va., who died six months ago. The impostor succeeded by having papers stolen from Col. Hewitt in Atlantic City. He had a draft for ten thousand dollars cashed by a Philadelphia bank but through a son of Col. Hewitt the bank discovered the fraud and the money was recovered, having been deposited by the swindler in New York.

Death to Circus Animals.

Pawnee City, Neb., May 3.—A circus train arrived here and one of the animal keepers went through the elephant cars to see that all was right, when the gasoline torch which he carried exploded and the entire car was immediately in flames and all the animals in the car were burned. Four camels, three elephants, two sacred cattle and a black bear perished. The loss is estimated at about \$30,000, with no insurance.

Two policemen were also arrested. The four men gave bond aggregating \$6,000. The charges are the outgrowth of the riot following the attempt to close a poolroom at Madison last winter.

Due to Unrequited Love.

Lincoln, Neb., May 3.—George Harry, forty-six years old, until last Saturday a member of the Lincoln police force, last evening followed May Young his housekeeper, into a grocery store and shot her dead. He then shot himself with the same weapon, falling dead beside the woman. Infatuation for the woman, who it is said refused to marry him, is the only known cause for the tragedy.

An Imperial Surprise.

Berlin, May 3.—Emperor William surprised the people of Berlin by appearing on horseback in Unterden Linden last evening, having ridden from Potsdam. His majesty was enthusiastically greeted. It was his first visit to the capital since he returned from his cruise in the Mediterranean.

Walked Off Moving Train.

Sycamore, Ill., May 3.—Henry Wood, on route home with his family from Ocean Springs, Miss., walked off the train near Vincennes, Ind., while asleep, and was killed. He was not missed until his family reached Chicago. Mr. Wood came here in 1835, and served in the state legislature.

Shot at Crowd of Boys.

North Vernon, Ind., May 3.—Andrew Hartwell, fifty years old, fired a load of shot into a crowd of small boys, fatally injuring the nine-year-old son of H. C. Blankenship. The boys were annoying Hartwell by throwing stones at his house and calling him names.
