## FISHING SEASON

## Streams of Wayne County Full of Bass.

Never before have the streams in Wayne county and eastern Indiana held so many bass as this summer. Fishermen say this fact is due to the high waters of the early spring, and the continued swollen condition of the streams. Bass go up stream during periods of freshets, and they have come in great numbers from the larger rivers into the tributaries. Bass fishing has been unfavorable, however, for the reason that the waters were unsettled up to the time the spawning season began. Sportsmen of the rod, however, are anticipating great luck the remainder of the summer. The trolley lines have done much to facilitate the easy movements of the fishermen. The lines east and west out of Richmond carry great numbers of early morning anglers, especially on Sundays, when the streams in western Wayne county and just across the Ohio state line are objective points.
