DYING WOMAN'S STATEMENT

ADMITS TO HAVING MURDERED SEVERAL PARTIES

MOTHER AMONG OTHERS

The Story Regarded as Improbable—
Think Her Mind Affected.

Lebanon, O., June 25.—Miss Catherine Miller, aged 83, wealthy and known for her charity, who died at Fredericksburg, near here last week, is said to have confessed on her death bed to killing her mother, Mrs. Miller her sister, Mrs. George Albert her brother-in-law, Jacob Albert and the infant child of a niece. The story of the confession is told by the dead woman's niece, Mrs. Frank Ziegler, who says her aunt declared she killed the infant by sticking a pin in its brain, and the others with white powders, because she could not bear to see them suffer. Neighbors think Miss Miller's mind was possibly affected, and are inclined to doubt the confession.
