BIG LAND BATTLE NEAR PT. ARTHUR

ON THE 6TH, 27TH AND 28TH OF JUNE.

DETAILS OF SEA FIGHT

Are Meagre—Success of the Japanese—The Cavalry is Constantly Fighting.

Nagasaki, July 2.—The Vladovostok squadron was reported off Iku Island last night, and firing was heard at Golo Island.

Liao Yang, July 2.—Japanese are advancing over an extended front. The Russian troops are in splendid spirits. Kuropatkin is in personal command. The Russians are holding Dalin Pass. Fifteen trains are arriving daily at Mischenkos. The cavalry are fighting constantly.

Seoul, July 2.—A semi-official report was received by the Japanese legation of a naval engagement yesterday on the east coast. No details were obtainable.

St. Petersburg, July 2.—Nothing is known here of the sea fight on the east coast.

Lia Yang, July 2.—The Japanese guards division were engaged in an attack on Talin Pass retiring eastward. They were pursued by a Russian force.

Chee Foo, July 2.—It has been learned here that there was a big land battle near Port Arthur on the 26th, 27th and 28th of June. The Japanese were successful. They occupied the heights within ten miles from Port Arthur. The Japanese losses are not known, but the Russian losses are heavy.
