ENGAGE IN A FIERCE BATTLE  
AT PORTLAND.

### THE CAUSE OF DISPUTE

Lake Erie Ditches Cars on Street and  
Citizens and Employees Tear  
Them Out.

Portland, Ind., July 4.—The Lake Erie & Western railroad fought a losing battle here yesterday afternoon with the new Cincinnati, Bluffton & Chicago railroad, which is constructing its tracks through this city.

Understanding fully that the Lake Erie & Western was bent on contesting the right of the new road to a certain portion of Water street, the latter road took advantage of Sunday to lay its tracks across the disputed belt and avoid an injunction suit.

The construction gangs were put to work early this morning and local employes of the Lake Erie saw that something was about to happen. Lake Erie headquarters were notified and a small army of construction and section men was sent here to build and switch cars on the ground and to block the way with two box cars, but the new road saw what the Lake Erie was preparing to do and sought to forestall the blockade by placing wagons with ties and rails on the disputed ground.

Seeing that they were about to be defeated in their attempt to blockade the way, the Lake Erie train of several cars which stood on the track was rapidly backed toward a frog rail had been placed on the track and three cars were dumped across the way. A Lake Erie wreck train was already on the way from Lima, O., which arriving in a few minutes, undertook to dump additional cars on the ground.

The new road continued the construction as rapidly as possible and when the wrecked cars were reached promptly placed ropes over the first car and 300 citizens joined in to help clear the right of way. Section Foreman Ed Sible of the Lake Erie cut the rope, whereupon a big, burly railroad man on the other gang ran him away with an asp hammer.

Several hundred citizens congregated and plainly the sympathies were with the new road. One car was pulled off the grounds and another was being chopped to pieces when Supt. Dyer of the Lake Erie arrived and announced that his road was ready to give up the fight.

He explained that he had found that the franchise did not give them the ground over which they were fighting. The Lake Erie had given orders that if necessary twenty-five cars should be wrecked.

The Lake Erie is practically loser to the extent of \$3,000 in rolling stock and this city will file criminal proceedings probably and several civil suits.

It was only by mere accident that several people were not killed by the wrecking of the cars across the street. The feeling among citizens was very bitter toward the Lake Erie.

## WROTE A LETTER

It Gave a Clue to the Officers and Bates Is Now In Jail.

### GAVE UP GRUDGINGLY

Sheriff of Union County Found His Man Ready to Fight With Revolver and Knife.

Horsestealing, Bigamy and Forgery Charged Against Man Wanted in North Carolina.

Liberty, Ind., July 5.—A. A. Bates was arrested by John Yaryan, sheriff of this county, at the request of J. M. Davis, sheriff of Surry county, North Carolina, who alleges that Bates is wanted in that county for horse stealing, bigamy and forgery. Sheriff Yaryan and deputy drove to the home of Samuel Edgeworth, a highly respected citizen, where Bates was staying. Seeing the officers coming, Bates attempted to escape, but was driven back into his room and forced to surrender by the sheriff, who found him armed with a revolver and a knife. Bates has been committed to jail to await the coming of the North Carolina sheriff with requisition papers. The prisoner is silent and refuses to talk. He had been staying with the Edgeworths for some time, and had aroused their suspicions because he never left the house unarmed. His hiding place was revealed to the sheriff of North Carolina through a letter mailed by him to a North Carolina friend.

### DRIVEN TO DESPERATION

Young Man at Columbus Rendered Frantic by Cruel Beating.

Columbus, Ind., July 5.—Suffering from injuries he received when he was beaten almost to death by a gang of young rowdies, Emmett Brown, aged twenty-one years, son of Henry Brown of this city, made a desperate attempt to commit suicide by strangling himself with a necktie. Brown was met by a gang of five or six young men in the alley in the rear of the Cyclone saloon. The entire gang attacked him and gave him a terrible beating, leaving him unconscious. He was carried into his home and remained in a semi-conscious condition all night. In the morning, while his mind was deranged, he attempted suicide by tying his necktie about his neck and pulling both ends until he became black in the face. He also beat himself in the head with his fists. Physicians believe he will recover. He refuses to tell the names of his assailants.

Mystery Surrounds Tragedy.

Marion, Ind., July 5.—Mystery surrounds the death by shooting of Margaret Terrell, a young woman of Gas City. The body was found in a grove near Gas City. Everett Athens, twenty-three years old, who lives in Summitville, notified Marshal McClary, saying that the young woman shot herself. He says they took a walk and went to this grove, in the northern part of the city. While sitting on the ground talking, he removed a revolver from his pocket and laid it on the ground. He alleges that Miss Terrell picked up the revolver, pointed it at her head, pulled the trigger and the bullet went through her brain. Athens was arrested and placed in jail while an investigation is being made. He will be held on the charge of murder. An investigation of the spot where the body was found shows signs of a struggle.

### Big Scare for Nothing.

Elwood, Ind., July 5.—The big scare of the merchants and citizens generally of this city over the shutdown of the tinplate mills last Thursday has proved to have been unnecessary, as the hot mills resumed work today. Many of the employees wanted a two-weeks' vacation, but were much relieved because the scale has been signed for next year, with the orders of the company requiring resumption of work.

### Caught at the Crossing.

Kendallville, Ind., July 5.—Winfield Martin and Philip Hathaway, aged respectively forty-five and sixty-five, laborers, while driving homeward in a wagon from this city, were struck by a west-bound passenger train and instantly killed. The horses were unhurt but the wagon was broken. The men were hurled fifty feet and more. Martin was unmarried. Hathaway had a wife and two daughters.

### Nice Trip for Company B.

Terre Haute, Ind., July 5.—Company B, I. N. G., of this city, fifty-six strong, has left for St. Louis for a ten days' stay at the World's Fair. Company B, which has the reputation of being the best-drilled military organization in Indiana, goes to the fair on its own accord and own expense.

### Combine Their Interests.

Crawfordsville, Ind., July 5.—Sixteen grain elevators in western Indiana have merged their interests. The new corporation will be known as the Crabb's, Reynolds, Taylor company and is incorporated for \$200,000. The home office will be maintained in Crawfordsville.






