## ALCOHOL

Taken From Sawdust Reported From Norway.

Alcohol from sawdust is a discovery reported from Norway. According to the chemist who has invented the process, 100 kilograms of sawdust are made to yield from six to seven kilograms of alcohol, together with by-products of acetic acid and methyl alcohol. The saving in price is represented by the difference, \$10.50, the cost of 100 kilograms of potato alcohol in Norway, and \$6.50, the cost of the same amount of alcohol made from sawdust.
