The Palladium announced the other day that "Jed" Newkirk and his "999" was at Terre Haute and intended giving the people some fast running. It was also predicted that a number of people would be disappointed. That such was the case will be gleaned from the following dispatch:

Terre Haute, Ind., Aug. 7.—Thirty five hundred people who had gone to the fair grounds this afternoon to see the automobile races, the star feature of which was to have been J. S. Newkirk's race in the "999," were disappointed.

Newkirk was advertised to make a race against the world's record, which is now held by the machine he drives. The "999" refused to work on Sunday.

The anxious people waited from 3 o'clock until after 6 o'clock to see the dare devil make his ride and at 6:30 the race was called off and W. H. Pickens, manager for Newkirk, was taken in charge by Captain of Police Battle and taken to the police station.

After the people had waited for hours and it had become certain that the racing machine could not be operated, hoodlums agitated an attack on Manager Pickens, and although there was no disturbance the authorities deemed it advisable to take Pickens from the grounds.

At the police station he explained that the action of the machine was unavoidable. It was agreed to have Newkirk drive next Sunday, when those who attended today's meet will be admitted free.

The homeless man cannot work with the regularity and efficiency of his fellow safeguarded and strengthened by home comforts and blessings. President Cassatt of the Pennsylvania, is no dreamer. Like all eminent successful business men, he studies things as they are, and by wise, prudent, cautious, gradual management strives to bring them, year by year, nearer to what they ought at the best to be.

The richest possession of any corporation is not its plant, or its subscribed capital, or its reserve fund, but its corps of efficient employees. Easy it is to say that men are easily replaced. No efficient man is replaced

perfectly but by promoting an efficient man from a subordinate position.
