AT KOKOMOTHEY KEEP HOUSE AND ARE
BOTH HAPPY

SEWING MACHINE

Operated by Blind Woman Heard by
Passersby—Their Young Chil-
dren Can See.

Kokomo, Ind., August 9.—A stranger
passing the home of Mr. and Mrs.
William Brinkman, a Kokomo blind
couple, and hearing the merry hum of
the sewing machine would little sus-
pect that it was operated by a wom-
an who, like her husband, was bereft
of her sight in childhood by an at-
tack of measles. Mrs. Brinkman is
an expert and can make the most fan-
cy and delicate ruffles and tucks. The
most skeptical would be convinced up-
on seeing any of the fourteen new
dresses she has just made for her-
son, of a few weeks, Paul Wishard
Brinkman, whom people from far and
near come to see. Paul's eyes are as
good as those of any one, and he is
proving very entertaining to women
visitors, as he is just beginning to
cook. Mrs. Brinkman is a good cook,
and when she has not the time her
husband, a remarkable blind man,
can do any part of the housework in
her stead.

The little home in which the Brink-
man's live is the product of Mr.
Brinkman's great energy. When he
came to Kokomo he had only \$48,
the price of 1893 having swept away
all he had, being then the owner of a
notion store. He went in debt for a
peanut roaster, and later his home,
and today does not owe any one a
cent. He has operated this roaster
several years without help, utilizing
gasoline as a fuel and has never had
an accident. He does all his own re-
pairing.

In fact, Mr. Brinkman has a genius
for machinery. It is a life passion
and had he eyes he would be an elec-
trician. He chafes under the limita-
tions of his sphere. Mr. Brinkman
would like to go to the World's Fair,
if he dare leave his business, and
there would hope to study machinery
by feeling of the detached parts.
"Billy" can not "see" that it is
anything unusual for him to cultivate
a garden. He has a small one each
year. A set of strings, with the house
as a starting point, is intelligible to
him where the beans begin and the
radishes and peas leave off. He is
death on weeds, and smiles derisively
when a person asks him if he can tell
the difference.

Electric vs. Steam Roads.

The comparative advantages gained
in transforming a steam railroad to
electricity for motive power were thus
summed up before the Richmond,
gives freedom from dust, smoke and
cinders; the simplicity of the loco-
motive facilitates the rapidity with
which repairs can be made on the mo-
tor, it can be put in service with no
delay to get up the steam, and break
down of individual motors is not so
likely to occur. Its uniform motive
effects or tropic gives greater tractive
efforts and reduces the wear and tear
due to slipping of wheels, thus in-
creasing the life of the motor, and the
higher motive speed which are readily
obtained make it impossible to use
smaller wheels, while the absence of
unbalanced rotating and reciprocating
parts permits these speeds to be at-
tempted without serious damage to
track or machine, and reduce the
weight of the machine to simply that
required for tractive purposes only.
Where the path of the return current
is from the drive to the rails a con-
siderable increase in tractive effort is
obtained above that due to the weight
alone. On the other hand, attention
was called to the fact that the destruc-
tion of a power house or boiler would
tie up an entire system, while the blowing
of a fuse or the throw of a circuit breaker
may stop every train operated from a
given power house. In addition the
whole system of railroads operated
by electricity cannot be readily or
quickly increased. To double the
capacity of a system requires the
doubling of the number of the motors
and doubling the size and capacity
of the power stations, whereas with
steam the doubling of the number of
locomotives settles the question.
